#### CHINESE DELEGATION VISIT DELEGATE

A group from Beijing China visited Delegate on Tuesday 3rd December, calling at the Bundian Way Gallery to view the aboriginal and local art on display. They also called at the Settlers Hut, the School of Arts, the local School and inspected the accommodation at the Nurses Cottage and River Cottage. They had lunch at the Delegate Hotel before continuing on to Bombala where they stayed the night. The visit came about as a result of an Agri Tourism Conference recently held in China, which was attended by Bombala Mayor Bob Stewart and Mayor of Cooma Monaro Shire Dean Lynch. The conference was organised in part by Hugh Kater, son of Ned and Ann Kater of Cambalong, Bombala. Hugh has lived in Beijing with his partner Mei for the past two years. Following on from that visit, Bombala and Cooma Shires hosted the Chinese Delegation's recent visit, which sees a potential for School Camp visits as

early as 2015. They also spoke of the possibility of earlier visits by families and stressed out executives, who would be staying at the Nurses Cottage or River Cottage. If the plans comes to fruition it will be a boost for local economies.

While at the Gallery they purchased three paintings, two from the Bundian Way Gallery, and one from the Borderline Gallery.

# REMEMBRANCE DAY IN DELEGATE

Due to inclement weather, Delegate's second Remembrance Day service was held in the School of Arts. A good number of people turned out to honour the sacrifice of the many thousands of Australians in past wars.

Delegate RSL Sub-branch President, Phil Pope, began proceedings by explaining the origins of the catafalque party, the four armed personnel who stand guard at cenotaphs during military services. He expressed his hope that he might be able to entice a catafalque party to Delegate for future Remembrance Day services. Robyn Mikula then recited the Prayer of Remembrance. The school children were very impressive in their readings of "In Flanders Fields" (Ellery Farran and Claudia Tonks), and "We Shall Keep the Faith" (Faith Cocker, Dylan Robinson and Bryson Phillips Jones). Phil Pope then



gave a very interesting Commemorative Address. This was followed by the wreath and poppy laying, with Sophie Stewart and Brahnie Mitchell laying the wreath on behalf of the Delegate Public School. After the Ode and the Last Post, the service was concluded with everyone singing the National Anthem. Several of the RSL members later gathered at the RSL Sub-Branch building where they planted a rosemary bush. The wreaths were then moved to the war monument.

The Delegate sub-Branch of the RSL would like to extend a very grateful thank you for the support shown to us by the township of Delegate.

It was particularly welcome to see such a large turnout for Remembrance Day this year in spite of the inhospitable weather.

We were especially thankful to the Delegate

Primary School children for their assistance with singing the National Anthem and particularly those mentioned in Sandra's article elsewhere in this edition who did a marvellous job with the readings and wreath laying. Finally thank you to the Delegate School of Arts Committee for allowing us the use of their hall at the 11<sup>th</sup> hour when the weather turned against us.



# **DELEGATE SCHOOL NEWS**

#### **Excursion to Bendoc**

A fantastic day of challenging activities at Bendoc was enjoyed by our local students. The TRIC day (Teamwork Rubric Initiative Challenges) saw about thirty grade 3, 4 and 5 students from Delegate, Bibbenluke and St Joseph's Primary Schools come together for fun, friendship and above all teamwork at Opportunity Farm.

In clans of ten, the students decided on their challenges, thought about strategies and tried to beat their best efforts. Points were earned for degrees of success which contributed to scoops of sand at the home base. As the challenges were met, the points added up until the last scoop of sand lifted a counterweighted bucket to reveal a collective prize. Chocolate lovers were very happy!

The challenges required mental and physical strategy and every member of the team had to contribute to their clan's effort. Among the challenges was the log balance. The clan had to step onto a log see-saw to find the balance point with every member on board. There was also the log jam. This needed the clan to cross from both sides of a raised log, find their way around their team-mates to the other side without falling off. Great ideas were tried and then it was time for blindfolds! There were several challenges and all required great thinking skills and teamwork.

Everybody had a great time and thank you to the Farran family for hosting us all.





#### CRACKED WILLOW EXCURSION

On the 30th October the students were invited down to the river bank by Mr Anthony Reed on behalf of the (Southern River Catchment Authority)

Who are doing some work on the removal of the cracked willow trees as they are choking up our river systems. The students learnt how and where these trees came from, how they spread, the difference between Weeping willow and Cracked Willow. Mr Reed also pointed out how plants from our home gardens have ended up in the river system along with rubbish such as tyres and prams. In the coming weeks the students will see more of the machines in action and the positive progress they will make.



#### Azaleas and Rhododendrons (By Susan Tocchini)

Gardens change over time most often becoming shadier as trees and shrubs mature. Azaleas and Rhodo-dendrons are long lived and often find themselves stranded in deep shade due to the way the garden has matured. They need sunlight to flower well, usually morning sun is best as hot afternoon sun can wither flowers and/or bleach the flowers and foliage.

When establishing a new garden we often put plants too close together not quite visualising how that tiny potted plant will fill out. The result can be a gaggle of spindly shrubs needing attention both for shaping and pest control. Fortunately if azaleas or rhododendrons are surprisingly good candidates for relocation even if very large because their particular root structure withstands disturbance. Their root systems are fibrous and therefore confined and this is why they make good pot specimens. These small diameter roots have the capacity to rapidly regenerate when severed so water supply is soon restored. The best time to move them is either Spring and Early Summer when tissues are actively regenerating and before this operation if needed be reduced by two thirds.

Azaleas and Rhododendrons come from cool mountain regions known as cloud forest and this alerts us as to why they are so frequently disfigured by mites and thrips in Australian gardens. Mites and thrips thrive in low humidity and multiply rapidly on hot summer days, conditions not normally encountered in the plant's native habitat. Damage is seen as silvered leaves that suffer premature death, and also, as distorted flower buds that may fail to open. It is difficult to control these insects with the more benign contact sprays like Pyrethrum because they live and feed on the under surface of the leaf. If the infestation is severe or of long standing the first step in bringing the plant back to health is to spray with a systemic insecticide like Confidor. Unfortunately this chemical will kill beneficials like ladybirds and bees so caution is necessary, and, this chemical will damage plants if used either on hot days or when the plant is water stressed.

An effective control strategy where infestation is light is to increase the humidity and this is done by putting a sprinkler under the plant so that the undersides of the leaves become wet. Those insects that are not washed off are now in such low numbers that the ladybirds can finish them off. However, such water 'treatment' really only works for thick, leathery leaves that individually have a long life. Notice that leaves have a different structure on the upper surface and under surface. The upper surface is designed to shed rain and protect the delicate under-surface that carries the stomates or breathing pores. The majority

of garden plants have thin short-lived leaves. Thinner leaves are more prone to physical damage and the presence of water on the underside may encourage disease entry, sunscald and even the leaching of soluble nutrients directly from the leaf.

Nutrition for Azaleas and Rhododendrons can be a bit tricky. The soils in their original habitat are well drained, thin and acid and as a consequence available nutrient levels are low which explains why these plants resent clay soils, waterlogging and high levels of fertiliser. They do best on light soils supplemented by an annual dressing of cow or sheep manure. Manures are 'soil conditioners' that fluff up the soil by raising the level of organic matter i.e. soil carbon. This enhances soil structure by increasing air space that fosters root health, the activity of soil organisms that cycle nutrients and energy into a plant accessible form and in addition to maintain correct acidity.


