WATER RESTRICTIONS Nimmitabel, Delegate and Bombala Water Supplies

Applies from 12:00pm, Saturday 14 December 2019, until Further Notice

With the prolonged dry weather conditions, flows to the Lake Wallace Dam and Delegate and Coolumbooka Rivers have decreased. This has meant less available water at the Nimmitabel, Delegate and Bombala water treatment plants and reservoirs. Residents in Nimmitabel, Delegate and Bombala are advised that as of 12:00pm, Saturday 14 December 2019, Level 3 water restrictions are in place until further notice.

Activity	Level 3 Water Restrictions		
Private Gardens and Lawns,	The watering of lawns is not permitted.		
Parks, Sport Amenities and Public Gardens	Gardens and plants may be watered, subject to the below conditions.		
Watering Systems	Sprinklers & irrigation systems can be used to water gardens and plants, but only once a week between 5pm and 8pm -Saturday for even house numbers, Sunday for odd house numbers.		
	In-ground water systems, soaker hoses or micro sprays cannot be used.		
Hand Watering	A hand-held hose fitted with a trigger nozzle can be used between 7am-10am and 3pm-6pm based on an odds & evens system (e.g. odd house numbers or rural address numbers on 1st 3rd, 5th, even house numbers on 2nd, 4th, 6th, days of the month).		
	A bucket or a watering can may be used at any time.		
Washing Vehicles	If not washed at a commercial car wash, any vehicle must be washed on a lawn or other porous surface and then must only be washed by using a bucket or watering can.		
Swimming Pools	Existing swimming pools may only be topped up using the odds & evens system (e.g. odd house numbers or rural address numbers on 1st, 3rd, 5th, even house numbers on 2nd, 4th, 6th, days of the month) and only if they have a pool cover.		
Bowling Greens	Can only be watered for 2hrs/day.		
Paved Areas	Water must not be used to clean paved areas unless cleaning is necessary as a result of accident, fire, health hazard or other emergency.		
Window and Building Washing	Gutters may be cleaned at any time using a hose with a trigger nozzle.		
	Water must not be used to clean windows or buildings unless cleaning is necessary as a result of accident, fire, health hazard or other emergency.		
Construction & Related Activities	Non-potable water must be used for dust suppression.		
Automatic Flush Toilets	Must not be used.		
General Exemptions	Fire Fighting		
	Rainwater (as long as the tank/dam is not topped up from, or switched to, the drinking water supply)		
	Reclaimed water (generally supplied through purple pipes)		
	Greywater (water from sinks, showers, washing machines etc)		

These restrictions will apply to all properties connected to the Nimmitabel, Delegate and Bombala water supply schemes. The restrictions will apply until further notice. More stringent restrictions may be imposed should conditions fail to improve.

Under Section 637 of the Local Government Act 1993, a person who wilfully or negligently wastes or misuses water from the public water supply, or causes any such water to be wasted, is guilty of an offence for which the maximum penalty is a fine of \$2,200.

Council advises that for all other towns on water supply, a conserve water notice is now in place, with details below.

Bombala Demerge Progressing as Deputy Premier supports Gundagai demerger

There has been an apparent policy backflip on council demergers by the State Government. Early last week Minister Shelley Hancock announced that the Gundagai and Tumbarumba demerge petitions were valid and that the matters would be referred to the Boundaries Commission for official examination. This is the next step toward demerging and comes after the government had sat on the petitions for many months. It is understood that the Deputy Premier supported the decision in a recent meeting with the Premier and Minister in Sydney.

The regional fallout from this snap decision has been rapid with Hilltops Council (Boorowa, Young, Harden) Mayor, Brian Ingram (formerly of Delegate) loosing a no confidence motion at a special meeting during the week. This comes at a time when the Hilltops General Manager resigned unexpectedly and now Mayor Ingram is openly supporting residents to sign demerge petitions circulating in their towns.

Buoyed by this policy change Save Bombala Inc will now formerly submit the local demerge petition to Minister Hancock for consideration. In order to give residents one last chance to sign up Save Bombala Inc. will have a table at the Bombala Street party on December 13 with petition forms ready to sign on the night. Anyone who is unsure if they have signed up already can check on the night. The petition started circulating at the federal election in May and even though Save Bombala have already collected sufficient signatures they want to give all residents the opportunity to make their mark on the future of our local council.

THE DELEGATE TENNIS CLUBS RECEIVES GOOD NEWS.

The Delegate Tennis Club recently had a very productive meeting with Tennis Australia, and will shortly be receiving a \$5000 pack to support to promote tennis in the area. The aim is to encourage more adults to take up tennis, which for some years has seen numbers decreasing. A concerted effort, involving all tennis clubs titled "Get your Racquet On" will hopefully see more people taking part in this very enjoyable and beneficial sport.

Something, which has proved very popular for older participants, will be a half court game to encourage those who are not as agile as they used to be.


It would be great to see a revival of tennis in the area and it was once the major sport.

Gardening News

Last week frost touched many new summer plantings. It is always a conundrum when things are half dead whether to discard the plant or to start again with new plants. Since gardeners are by nature nurturers, we tend to retain the damaged plants in the hope that 'they will come good'. The plants that will probably survive and thrive are those with multiple stems or underground storage structures that also produce buds such as dahlias and peonies. Those plants with strong vertical growth such as trees will change form and become bushy as the side shoots develop to replace the dominant growing point that was killed by frost.

Unfortunately, the 'nurture' strategy applied to vegetables causes delayed development which comes at the cost of a reduced crop. If we raise our own seedlings it is always wise to grow more than we really need to cover losses to frost or sunburn that is so common on planting out.

But then, when the spares are not needed after all, it is very hard to ditch them. There is always the option of giving them to a neighbour, but often we are tempted to plant them anyway by poking them into odd spots or overcrowding existing plantings. The ones in odd spots are invariably neglected and the overcrowding ones lead to reduced performance for each individual plant if not disease problems. I recognise too well this compulsive behaviour in myself and consequently admire those disciplined (read ruthless) gardeners that have neat orderly rows of plants.

Frustratingly this year early heat and wind made the Spring display disappointing. Flowers that normally give weeks of colour such as iris, daffodils, rhododendrons seem to have come and gone overnight. Greater fluctuations in temperatures, as well as reduced humidity, are the new norms due to climate change. The challenge for gardeners is that everything that we have learnt about plantings in the past is no longer applicable for the future so we now have to re-examine everything we think we know.

Hedges and shelter belts will play an increasingly important role in the garden as will larger plants that throw shade. Those plants that normally thrive in a full sun position e.g. tomatoes benefit from some shading during the day. Sunburn on tomatoes appears as white hardened skin and underlying flesh. Sun protection can be achieved by growing more leafy types (potato-leafed varieties), reduced pruning or erection of shade sails. Field growers of crops such as apples and grapes are already resorting to spraying fruit with sunscreens.

Pollination of fruit trees was poor here this year mostly due to the collapse of insect populations but it was also hampered by the low humidity/wind that reduces the viability of pollen. Pollination problems are emerging worldwide. The situation is so bad in China that workers clamber through trees to hand pollinate stone fruit and in Japan nurseries stock vials of kiwi fruit pollen. Germany has had a 76% loss of insect biomass recently and has given 100 million euros to the protection of insects and the education of the population starting at preschool. An important aspect addressed there is the reduction of the light pollution that has been shown to interrupt mating of insects.

What can we as individuals do? Firstly, really appreciate that we rely on a functioning environment for our own survival and secondly, cultivate a thoughtful attitude to everything we do, to be mindful that things are changing more rapidly than they have in the past and recog-

nise that we have much to learn in order to adapt.

In practice we can grow a bigger range of plants with the aim of providing flowers all year round, turn off outside lights, provide water for particularly bees and butterflies to drink and of course no insecticides. When providing water for insects and birds it is essential to prevent drownings by providing emergent rocks or sticks.
