Bundian Way Art Gallery – Art signposting the future

Saturday 1st December saw the culmination of a years work by diverse groups, The Delegate Progress Association, The Eden Local Aboriginal Land Council, Koori and local artists, The Royal Agricultural Society, The Bombala Council and the list goes on. The event was the opening of the Bundian Way Gallery

At the opening ceremony all speakers acknowledged the significance of the cooperation between the different groups and the signpost for the future that this represents.

The gallery was opened by Mark McKenna, author of recently published *Looking for Blackfellas Point*, who also emphasised the historical precedence of this new Gallery, as the regions first dedicated Aboriginal Art gallery, and a recognition of the Aboriginal's role in managing and representing the landscape we view today.

The ceremony was opened by Bill Guthrie, followed by BJ Cruse who provided Welcome to Country. Other speakers included John Blay the SEF coordinator, who outlined the progress of the Bundian Way project, thanked the DPA for their tireless efforts in making the gallery a reality and introduced the three artists exhibiting in the gallery; Lee Cruse, Cheryl Davison and Don Atkinson. Jocellin Jansson from the RAS praised the efforts of Emma Sellers and Karen Cash in obtaining the grant to refurbish the old bank. She was then presented with a posy by Jazzy Thompson.

As well as the Bundian Way Gallery opening, the Borderline Gallery's latest exhibition was opened by Mayor Bob Stewart.

After the doors to the Old bank were opened, the many visitors and locals were able to stroll through admiring the stunning collection of Aboriginal art from the South Coast Region, from Lee Cruse's delicate traditional art, to Cheryl's beautiful visual storytelling to Don's intricate baskets. The visitors were also able to meander through the lovely old building to view the Borderline Gallery collection of local art. To add to this feast of the senses were delicious nibbles and wine.

Before the afternoon was finished there were red dots next to many paintings and broad smiles on both aboriginal and local faces.

The Bundian Way is definitely a shared pathway and this first step along it provides a harmonious songline for the future.

How to Win the Ripe Tomato Battle

Many gardeners have given up on the challenge of getting tomatoes to ripen in our district. The principal constraint is believed to be a frost as late as November or December. Frost is highly likely again around the full moon at the equinox in March frustratingly followed by several weeks of the best ripening weather of the year – a sort of Indian Summer. The choice of variety is key to success.

Choose the appropriate variety for our conditions. I feel that the basic problem here is that the variety often chosen are those traditionally grown in the warmer coastal areas – large bodied leafy plants bearing very large individual tomatoes. Such varieties need a long time to form their frame before flowering even commences and each fruit needs many days to reach full size and many more to ripen. The leafiness that protects fruit from sunburn in hot places shields fruit too much for our more benign growing conditions.

Choose the appropriate variety for your needs. Do you want a few small tomatoes frequently to dress a salad? or meaty types to turn into preserves and sauces? or a larger tomato for slicing?

Choose the appropriate variety for your conditions. Are you growing in pots, poly tunnel or garden? There is an upside and downside for each of these methods.

In **pots** the soil needs to be airy and this is always coupled with free-drainage so keeping the water up will be critical to root health and will sometimes require multiple attentions daily. The roots can also die from overheating, especially if the pot is black plastic sitting out on paving on its own. In a **poly tunnel** light intensity is reduced (maturity of individual fruit delayed), humidity is higher (disease risk), and on clear days temperatures soar causing photosynthesis to temporarily shut down constraining growth potential. In the **garden bed** frost is the main danger but by-and-large it is the most successful method provided the watering is carefully done. Always water the soil not the leaves (disease and nutrient leaching) and try to not let the soil dry out as splitting may occur with the rewetting event.

Overriding all this are the general rules for all plant growth – soil temperature has the greatest influence on growth followed by night air temperature. This means that mulching is not always helpful especially early in the season when soil still needs to absorb heat from the direct sunlight falling on it. There is a compromise to be found between heat gain and water loss. Light is rarely limiting in Australia however high day temperatures in the absence of adequate soil moisture will cause the plant to shut down which in extreme form is seen as wilting.

Spread the risk. Grow a few different varieties established at different times so that the chances of having a crop increases. Finally a few well cared for plants are far more productive than too many overcrowded plants.

Here are some varieties that are reliable in Delegate. **KY1** is a sturdy low bush with full size fruit a little crinkled on the top. It was bred in Victoria especially to address our climate. **Roma** is a low bush with meaty fruit that can be sauced, dried or eaten fresh. It is cold resistant and does not readily split with the vagaries of weather. **Tommy Toe** is tall producing marble sized fruit over long period and the skin is not as tough as in cherry types. **Ibridio** has large smooth globular fruit in trusses suited to both open garden and glasshouse.

There is so much more to say about tomato culture but if what you are already doing works don't change a thing – just share your knowledge with your neighbour and always remember that the best thing you can do for health and well being is to garden, especially to grow your own food.

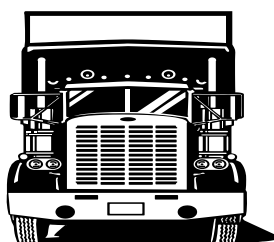

COUNCIL NEWS FROM COUNCILLOR BATEMAN

Short note on my activities in the past month or so. A bit late but I'll catch up eventually.

On 17 September I attended a HACC meeting in Bombala on issues confronting our local youth and possible remedies. A very interesting insight to our local problems and I'll be following up on this issue. The Mayor, General Manager and I attended a workshop in Cooma on 11 October about Councils and good governance. I met quite a few of the surrounding Region's mayors and Councillors. It was a worthwhile day catching up on changes to how Councils operate today. On 29 October I attended a wild dog day at the Corrawong Fire Shed. An interesting morning meeting our local representative Tony Barilaro and local land owners I hadn't personally met previously. The cross border issues are a real problem and I will follow with interest the efforts to resolve them. On the 11th of November, Remembrance Day, I was honoured to be invited to deliver the address at a service organised by the Delegate RSL Sub-Branch. The ceremony was well attended and I'd like to compliment the Sub-Branch on a good effort. I was invited to a meeting of the Bombala Historical Society on 12 November and delivered a talk on my responsibilities as the SES Liaison Officer at the Thredbo Land Slip Disaster.

I've attended 2 Council meetings since being elected and it has been an interesting time coming to terms with the changes in the way Councils operate since I was last on the old Tallaganda Shire Council. I think that I will be able to help along some of the needs of our local community being met.

I note that the staff are doing a good job on the Delegate – Bombala road. Pot holing still needs a bit of work in places but I'm sure we'll get there. I was most pleased that my suggestion at the Council meeting of 22 November that 3 big pot holes at the Delegate Sewage Farm were getting bad were fixed less than 12 hours later. I have sent an Email to the GM thanking staff for their prompt response. Also stage one of the main street footpath improvements have been completed. It will make quite a difference to the main street. Unfortunately I was not able to be at the Bundian way opening due to committing to attend a regional RSL meeting in Bega. Issues raised with me by local concerned people including drainage around the Kindergarten and other matters are being followed up. I hope to organise a meeting of all the Delegate Section 355 Committees early in the New Year to meet all the Committee members and see what future plans are in the pipe-line

Barbara and I wish everyone in the Southern region a very merry, safe, and enjoyable festive season. We do hope that Santa brings you all a little joy at Christmas.

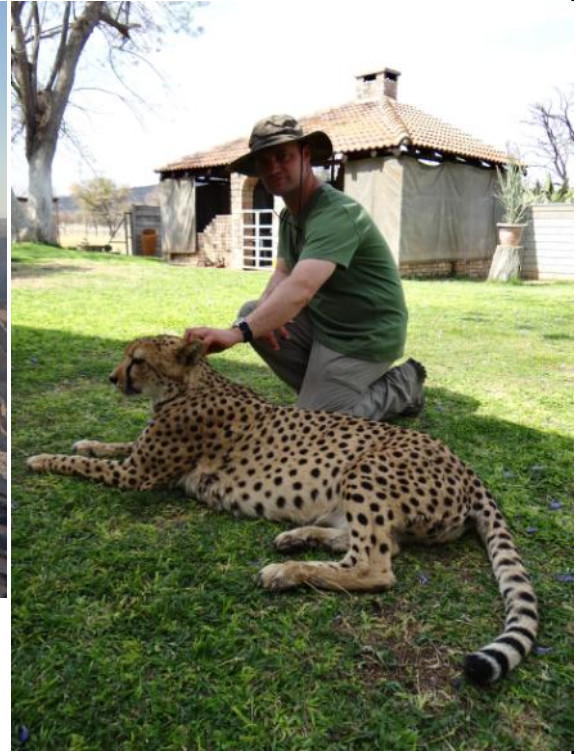

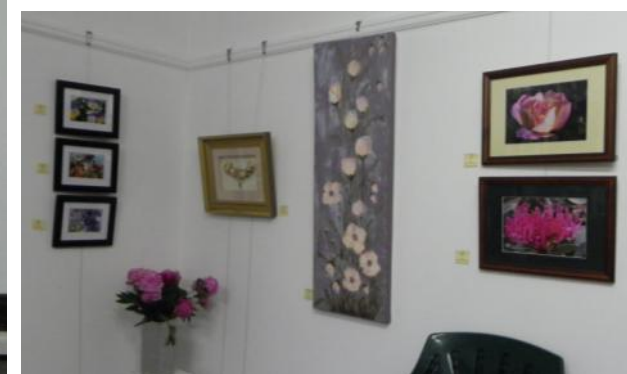

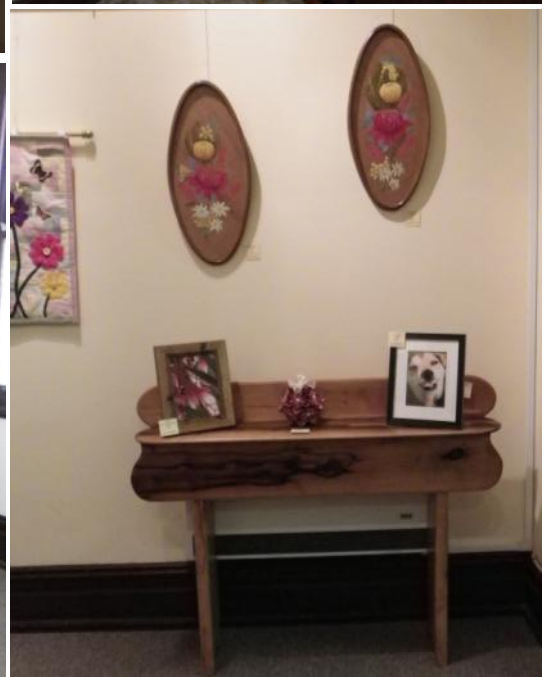

OBITUARY TOBY BLACK

Toby was born in Delegate on 29-7-1932. Eldest child of Alister Leslie (Dick) and Marguerita Mary (Rita) Black (nee Jones). Toby was educated at St. Josephs Catholic School Delegate. His main source of employment was with the PMG later to be known as Aust Post. His work started as delivery boy and with hard work rose to be Post Master. He worked in twenty seven post offices in southern NSW, and stayed in this type of work for forty one years, his last office being Bombala. Upon reaching retirement, he decided to buy The Delegate General Store, as he loved being of service to the public.

Declining health saw him have to sell.

Toby loved Rugby League, playing with different teams in towns that he worked in. He helped organise a few reunions over the years.

Toby spent the last seven months of his life in Bombala Hospital. He passed away on 16-9-2012. He is survived by three sisters Margaret Ralphs, Lesley Collins and Patricia Guthrie, eight nephews and nieces and fourteen great nephews and nieces.
