




#### HAPPY 40th BIRTHDAY TO TRENT TONISSEN.

## **RECYCLE REDUCE REUSE and RETHINK what our waste is and where our waste will end up!**

The Council want to reduce what goes to landfill as that extends the life of our landfills which reduces costs for both Council and residents.

There will be changes to how the local Garbage collection works and a public meeting will be held on the **23rd February**, **6pm at the Delegate School of Arts** to provide information on proposed alterations.

There will be much more emphasis on re-cycling and large re-cycling bins will be distributed to householders. The local tip may be open for an extra day, and the out of town bins will no longer be available. Education programs will be run on best recycling practices with the aim of improving community participation in waste avoidance and recycling initiatives.

Residents can help by learning about what they can and can't recycle in their local area, to ensure we're keeping valuable resources out of landfill and to help minimise our impact on the environment.

Recycling a single aluminium can saves enough energy to run a TV set for 3 hours. "We can all 'do our bit' to help,"

Council's kerbside recycling service collect paper and cardboard such as newspapers, magazines, phone books, cereal boxes and envelopes just as an example, glass bottles and jars, steel and aluminium cans

along with plastic containers that have the recycle symbols



1, 2, 3, 5 and HDPE, PET bottles.

Council would like to remind you that items such as syringes, disposable nappies, garden hose, poly pipe & polystyrene, paints and oils crockery, ceramics and drinking glasses, lightbulbs and batteries are NOT recyclable.


In July, 1886 an article in the Bombala River had completely frozen over. Apparently a number of locals, around 40 took advantage of the conditions to skate on the ice.

#### AN ARTICLE FROM AN OLD BOMBALA TIMES

Delegate, 25 miles from Bombala is the border township to Gippsland, distant some three miles as the crow flies, but by road it is 7 miles into Victoria. The township has been planned out, but not as yet surveyed, and those residents who have put up buildings do not at present know if they have built on the main road, street, or on their proper allotments. I wonder who is to blame? Several new buildings are in course of erection, besides those lately finished. I may specially mention the new Commercial Hotel, opened a month ago by Mr. Sellers, well and favourably known in the district. It is a commodious, wellconducted house, and anyone honouring the proprietor with a visit will find good entertainment for both man and beast. There are two stores kept by Mr. Wood and Mr. Wilton at which almost everything required for family use can be procured at little over Sydney prices. Mr. Woods, I may mention, en passant, was the pioneer of the famous Wood's Point diggings, from whom it took the name. Mr. Ross butcher has taken up a forfeited 40 acre selection on the outskirts of the township, over which he has experienced great trouble, delay, and expense and the selection is still in abeyance.

There are two mounted police stationed here, and although a piece of ground has been allotted for barracks, that is about all that has been done that respect as the troopers are located at a private residence some distance from the township instead of having their quarters in it. As this is the main road for all cattle and horses sent to the Gippsland markets which amount to a considerable number in the course of a year, one would naturally suppose that the police would be near at hand to supervise the mobs passing for any stolen or stray cattle. As the case now stands the stock may be over the border without their being aware of the fact.

#### Gardening with Water Shortage.

It was suggested that I write about how to keep plants alive in the extreme heat we are experiencing coupled with the water restrictions. Well it is a long story with many 'ifs' and 'buts' and 'exceptions' i.e. there are no black and white rules. However there are a few general things to consider in addition to your time available on a daily basis.

1. Remember that plants in pots suffer much earlier and more intensely. This is because their roots are always at higher temperatures especially when contained in heat absorbing black plastic pots. (The converse is true in Winter when roots are colder than in garden beds with a similar degree of restraint on function). The roots adjacent to the pot wall will die rapidly from heat stress and in extreme heat most potted plants will need attention several times a day. To minimise damage group pots and, if possible, move into the shade. Put a layer of insulation (cloth or cardboard) around the pot to minimise the soil heating at those times in the day that the sun falls on the pot. Do not leave in saucers full of water for any length of time as drainage is essential. Heat and waterlogging equals rapid bacterial and fungal growth resulting in root rots especially when roots are already damaged at the pot/soil interface. Most of the plants we keep in pots are the ones we consider to be too delicate for the general garden so added to these general physical effects is the inherent vulnerability of the subject plants themselves.

2. Organic mulch can keep the soil cooler and reduce evaporation if the soil beneath is already wet. However, it may also take a lot of water to penetrate this layer before the soil is wetted again once plants have exhausted the retained soil water. The converse occurs in winter when mulch prevents the sun warming the soil and the evaporation of excess soil water in rain periods. Stone mulch allows easy water penetration but also reflects heat to the underside of leaves magnifying the drying effect of high temperature in two ways – increased direct heat and the early closure of the stomata that are sited on the under-surfaces of leaves. The stomata are the lungs of the plant and when they close water transport ceases and the plant rapidly wilts. Watering plants in this condition rarely revives them as the cooling effect of applied water is ephemeral and in addition as it evaporates from the leaf surface there can be a "sunburn effect". This is most common on big leafed plants and manifests as white patches e.g. pumpkin leaves.

3. It is essential to give a solid watering that wets the root zone. Splashing a little water around does more harm than good as roots in dry parts of the soil still die inviting disease. Too much water is also wasteful as it percolates deeper than roots can access. One way to tell how far water has penetrated without digging a hole is to push a strong wire in until it meets resistance. Generally garden plants properly watered will last a week or more between waterings.

4. Have layers of vegetation to give shade protection and general cooling of the garden area as isolated shrubs are exposed to extremes 24/7 especially drying wind. This can be achieved with plantings of either deciduous trees or sparse crowned evergreens. However having too many deciduous trees may make leaf fall an arduous time in the garden and many are also water hungry e.g. silver birch. An alternative is the Australian deciduous white cedar *Melia azedarach* with its glossy leaves and bunches of pink flowers. The new dwarf Eucalypts such as snow gum 'Edna Walling' or *Eucalyptus rosaceae* that grow only 2-5 metres give filtered light and lovely flowers and habitat for beneficial insects and birds.

5. There has been much publicity about choosing to grow waterwise plants. This requires a cultural shift in the aesthetics of garden appreciation i.e renouncing the English style garden for one more appropriate to the environmental resources available to us. Climate change will only intensify and our individual share of water will only decrease further as population increases. We have to adjust our expectations. The most obvious potential area of water saving is to accept that a permanently green grass lawn is no longer realistic or responsible. Two ways to maximise the period of 'greenness' is to allow a thatch to develop over summer (i.e. do not scalp the

grass when mowing) and to have summer active grasses in the mix. In many southern parts of the U.S lawn has already been banned for decades.

6. Annual flower and vegetable gardens are both water intensive so it may be necessary to make some hard decisions about what can be realistically maintained during summer with the available water supply and quality. This especially important if you are relying on bore water as salts may accumulate in the soil over the season and years.
