## PAGININI COMES TO DELEGATE.

Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> March, saw a unique opportunity for a local audience to hear an internationally renowned violinist perform in their own town. An appreciative crowd in the Delegate School of Arts on Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> March were treated to Jonathon Glonek's masterful rendition of the Paganini's 24 Caprices, considered one of the most difficult ever written for the violin.

Jonathon who has played in St James Church on Picadilly, London, Carnegie Hall in New York, and Sydney Opera House, likes promoting serious classical repertoire to audiences which would not normally have the opportunity.

Jonathon who lives in Thailand visits his property over the border at Bendoc several times a year, and during one visit offered to do a performance of classical violin music, to raise money for maintenance of the historic School of Arts Building. He has promised that this performance won't be the last, and I am sure although there was a good crowd in attendance on Saturday, there will be even more when news of his performance spreads. ## Council and Other Doings from Bill Bateman

As I will be away for some weeks if you see no action over the next month or so on the issues I raised in last month's Delegate Doings I would recommend you ring Council and ask when action might possibly be taken on your particular issue.

Budget and planning meetings have agreed that, barring last minute changes, the following major works items will be undertaken in the Delegate area during the 2012/2013 financial year;

- Bitumen the steep hill out of Corrawong Creek on the Corrawong Road, and other resheetings \$160,000.
- Upgrade the Delegate Showground toilets \$95,000;
- Improvements to the Delegate caravan park, \$30,000; and
- Another 1Km of tar on the Highway South, \$170,000
- Minor works such as replacement of sewage pumps and other local jobs will also be undertaken.

Major works planned for 2014/2015 include;

- Delegate grandstand repairs \$20,000;
- Repair Showground bull yards and shed \$20,000;
- Continue Footpath upgrade \$20,000; and
- Tingaringi Rd 6.1Km resheet, \$116,900

I continue to lobby hard for other unfunded major works items in the district including;

- Widening of a culvert on the Tombong Rd;
- Delegate main street upgrade;
- Delegate Cemetery entrance and gutters;
- Further improvements to the Caravan park amenities block and a kitchen upgrade; and
- Tennis courts upgrade

The Delegate water supply problem is being worked on by staff and further information will become available as and when Government departments get back to us with more details on what might be done.

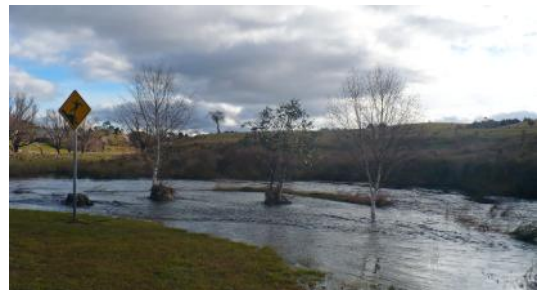

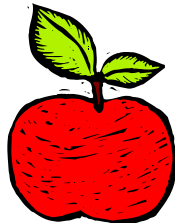

### BRUMBYS SCULPTURE

Doreen Standen advises the following:

She has contacted several experts, including Ann Cummins who is a conservator at Sydney Artefacts Conservation, and Paul Hopmeier, regarding the problems which have arisen with the brumbys' sculpture. Unfortunately the sculpture has proved to be unsuitable for outdoors, due to plaster and shellac being used as a finish. One way would be to take a mould and recast, which would prove to be very expensive. In its present state it would have to be placed under cover, and finding a suitable spot which is open to the public, is proving to be a problem.

One area being considered is the verandah of the RT/CT Centre, but it would have to be partly covered in, because of our very cold winter climate. Doreen continues to make enquiries to find appropriate conservators who may live closer to Delegate, but it looks like whatever is decided it will involve a great deal of cost.

We will keep you posted, when we have more information.

## Cherry Blossom Time.

Our ship the "Sea Princess" called at three ports, Nagasaki, Osaka and Yokohama, in Japan, on our Cherry Blossom Cruise, last March / April. At each port we went on excursions to see a little more of the countryside and culture.

At Nagasaki I chose to visit Arita, where there is a famous 600 year old porcelain pottery factory. Pottery from this place was exported to England and Europe over two centuries ago showing for the first time, their thin porcelain pottery ware which was highly prized. We saw the pottery being made, decorated and then saw the kiln used to fire it. The finished urns, vases and plates etc. were on show in their specialist shop, beautiful but I'm sorry to say well out of my price range!

On the drive to Arita, we travelled through wooded mountains, dotted with wild cherry trees, with flat farming valleys that followed the tiny rivers and streams. Agriculture appeared to be fairly primitive like rice paddies and orchards but with no sign of any mechanical equipment in use anywhere.

Cherry blossom time forms a very significant part of Japanese culture, there are 200 varieties of cherry blossom which are native to Japan and another 200 varieties that have been developed over the years. Cherry trees grow wild on the hillsides and are planted by the hundreds around the towns and prominent buildings.

The cherry blossom season is of short duration as well as being unpredictable. After a very long cold winter, Japan had a few days of quite hot weather the week before our ship arrived in Osaka, so we were very fortunate with our timing to see the cherry blossoms this season.

We visited Osaka Castle whilst we were in Japan where there were at least 600 trees out in flower, it was an unforgettable sight with hundreds of people having their picnics under the blossoming trees, because they believe their Gods will look favourably on them, sending down blessings with the falling blossoms.

At Yokohama, on Tokyo Bay, our last port in Japan, we were greeted with wind and pouring rain, weather not

withstanding, we took our coach to Hakone National Park. On our journey we had a pit stop at an ultra modern toilet block, which consisted of about 50 + toilet cubicles, as you entered, the light went on inside and outside. the seat was heated (sheer bliss in 14\* C temp.) and when you left the toilet, it automatically flushed. It was a real eye opener!

We continued on to our destination, where we took a cable car over a volcanic valley exuding sulphur fumes and the nearby hot springs, then we had a sail on a large volcanic lake. It was a shame that the rain persisted so we didn't catch sight of our main objective, Mount Fuji. We returned to the port and when everyone was back on board we set sail for our next destination of Iwo Jima.

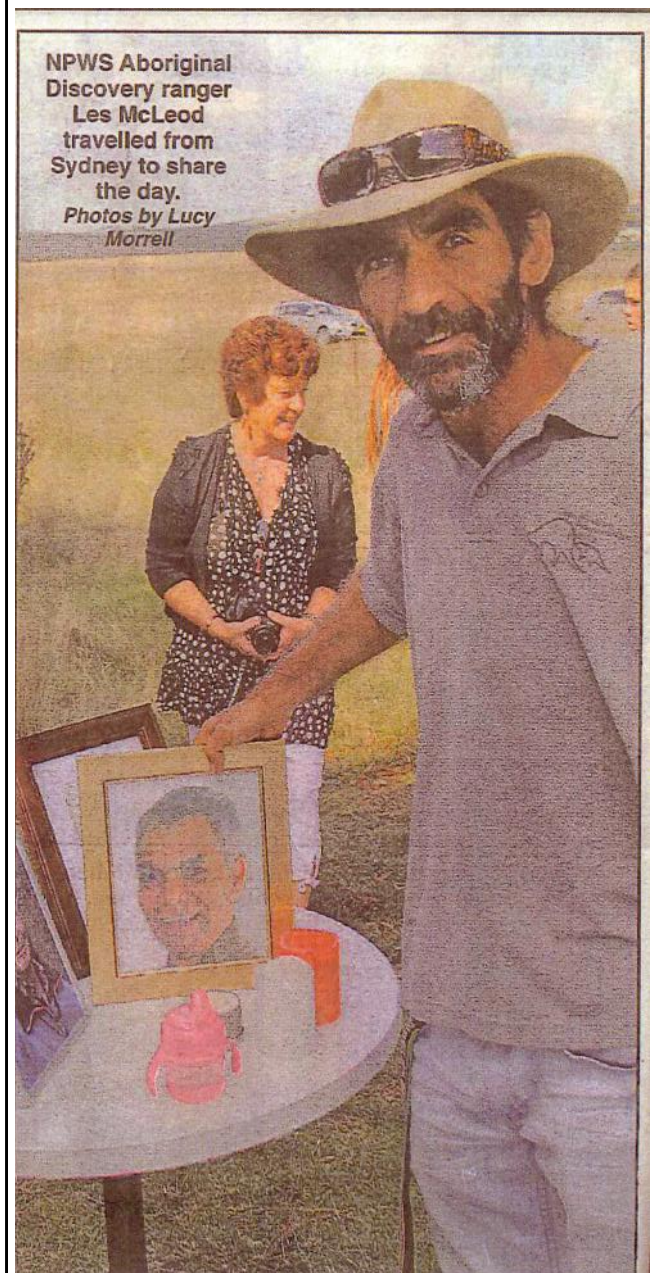

In the past three years there has been an average of one death, 482 hospital admissions and 1628 hospital emergency room visits with injuries as a result of dog attack . . . Almost 6

### **THE MEN FROM SNOWY RIVER MARCH COMMITTEE FORMED**

At a well attended meeting on 16th June, 2013 and committee was formed to plan the re-enactments of the Men From Snowy River March, which left Delegate on 6th January, 1916. Two separate items were on the agenda, one being the staging of the re-enactment in Delegate in 2016, the other being the Australia wide 100 year Anzac Centenary to be celebrated in 2015.

Nine recruitment marches took place in NSW during 1915/16, and there are plans to re-enact those marches to arrive in Sydney at the same time on the 11th November 2015. Councils and RSL branches will need to come on board for this to be achieved, and there has already been a meeting in Sydney at which representatives of the RTA were present. The logistics will be a big task, considering the difference in the traffic on our roads 100 years on, but if it can be achieved it would be a sight to see in Sydney. It was remarked at the meeting that the young men of today may not be as fit as those who marched off in 2016, so perhaps training would need to start now.

The local re-enactment will be along the same lines as the one held in 2006, which was very successful. The Duntroon Band has been reserved for the occasion, and other attractions are being planned. The Committee are as follows:

# LOOKING BACK



*A glimpse into the interior of one of Delegate's earliest shops owned by Edward Booth. In those days local stores carried everything from staple food items, to hardware, clothing and furniture.*

*Large biscuit tins can be seen in the background, and the contents were weighed into 1lb or 1/2 lb lots depending on the customers requirements and put into a paper bag. The same thing happened with tea, sugar, and flour etc. Nothing pre-packaged in those days. Cheese came in large round blocks and slices were cut off and weighed as required.*

*The large amount of landfill caused by today's pre-packaged items was not a problem back then.*

*The wastage of food which takes place today, would not have happened, then, because people knew how to be thrifty, often by necessity.*

# OSWALD BRIERLY EXHIBITION OPENS AT BUNDIAN WAY GALLERY

Bill Guthrie opened proceedings and invited Ossie Cruse to give the Welcome To Country. Ossie explained how when the people move from place to place the families and friends are always welcomed to the country. Karen Cash then acknowledged the roles played by all of the groups involved in the Bundian Way Project. The Eden Aboriginal Lands Council, the Bombala Council and the Bundian Way Committee. She also announced the funding of a project co-ordinator for the Bundian Way project. John Blay then explained how this amazing collection was put together with the help of Mark McKenna and the Mitchell Library. The Brierly journals had been in the Mitchell Library since the late 1850's when they were purchased by the founder of the library David Mitchell. This exhibition is the first time this work has been represented in a public arena. In putting together this exhibition and in collecting information about the Bundian Way many interesting stories have come to light.

John Blay was then joined by Mark McKenna as they shared some of Brierly's stories and their significance to the local people, in particular the links to the Bundian Way.

Oswald Brierly worked for Ben Boyd and travelled to the Monaro over the various routes from the coast. Brierly kept two journals, one for his in situ thoughts and sketches, another for the more considered watercolours and journal entries that could be completed in his time of relaxation. Brierly was very young at this time and his fascination with the indigenous people is reflected in his enthusiastic depictions of their way of life. Brierly's journals are one of the earliest records of the indigenous life and of the impact of European settlement. After a sharing of ideas between John, Ossie, Mark and the audience Mark formally opened the exhibition.

Councillor Sue Haslingden on behalf of the mayor then opened the Borderline Exhibition Fall into Winter, commenting that this exhibition like the Brierly exhibition represents the local artists interpretation of local life.

The people attending were then invited to partake of drinks and nibbles in the Borderline gallery and to wander at leisure the many rooms of both galleries.
