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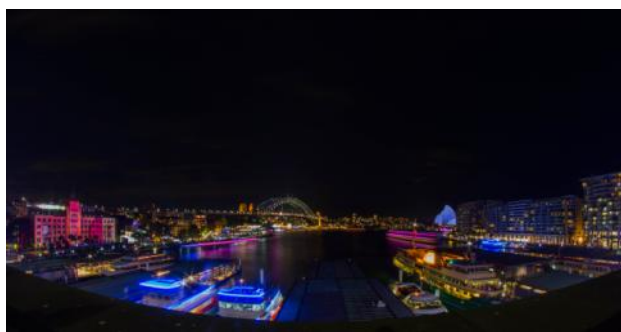

ELTON REUNION

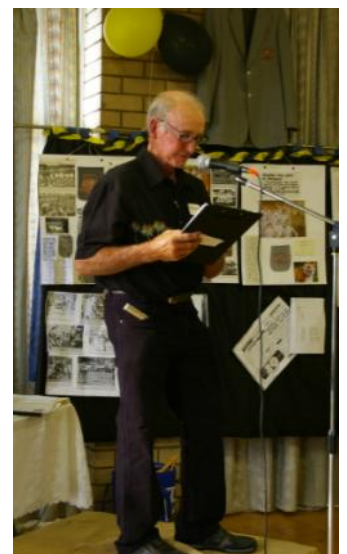

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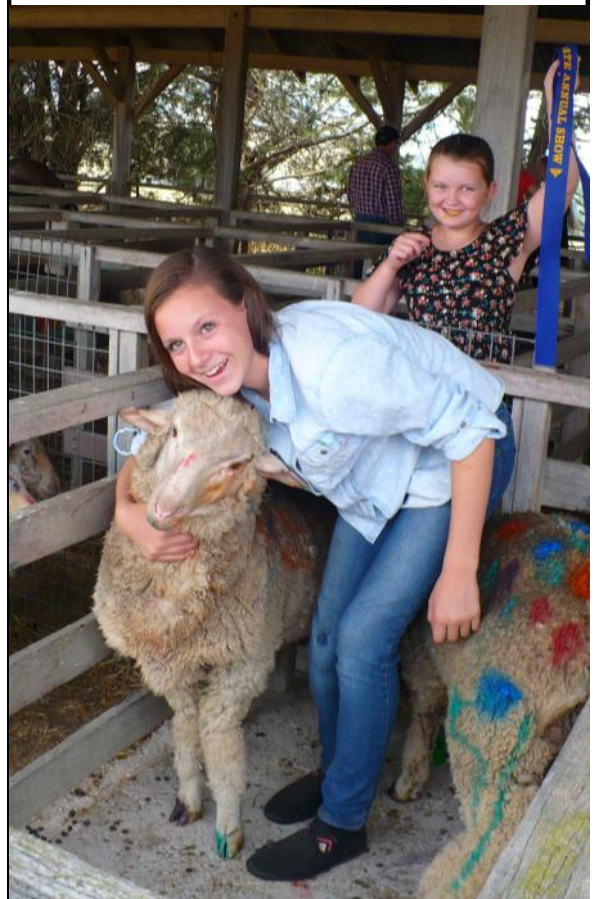

Harvesting and Storing Apples and Pears by Susan Tocchini

Apples display tremendous variation in appearance and taste as well as varying in their ripening behaviours and storage life. In some varieties the fruit readily drops as it ripens and some hold their fruit well into the cold weather e.g. 'Sturmer' which is really storage on the tree. Some need to be eaten straight away such as 'Cox's Orange Pippin' and some varieties store well like 'Pink Lady'.

However, there is one character that is true of all apple types and that is that **apples do not ripen off the tree**. To develop full flavour the fruit must be left as long as possible on the tree. Fruit picked too early will be tart and rapidly brown on cutting as well as shrivel in the fruit bowl. Fruit dropping from the tree is not always a sign that harvest should commence. When the crop is heavy, self-thinning occurs naturally particularly if there are sharp changes in the weather that cause a change in water availability to the developing fruit. Late fruit drop can be minimised by mulching or maintaining a grass cover under the tree as it helps prevent the roots becoming overheated on those very hot days.

To check for ripeness cut a fruit open every now and then. To tell if fruit is ready ripe look at the seeds – they should be still plump and a nice tan colour and the flesh should ooze juice. The seeds will become harder and darker as the fruit becomes overripe and simultaneously the flesh will become floury.

High humidity is the enemy of successful **apple storage** and this is why the fruits should not be stored skin to skin or in the fridge. Unblemished fruit will store well in an airy, cool dark place individually and loosely wrapped in paper

When researching a variety best suited to your needs remember that the typical characteristics of the variety may be modified by seasonal conditions (which are largely beyond our control) as well as with the age of tree and pruning history e.g. old and large unpruned trees usually produce small fruits with an extended ripening period dependent on access to light. Soil nutrition also has a direct bearing on flavour and the storage life of the fruit. The availability of calcium is a most important aspect so lime is traditionally applied in Autumn and dolomite in Spring to correct acid soil.

Pears are a little more tricky to ripen but much easier to store. **Pears do not ripen properly on the tree**. When the seeds become dark and they break easily from the tree the fruit are ready to pick. They are usually still rock hard at this point. They now need to have a cold treatment for the flesh to convert to a juicy buttery texture. Pears that have not been refrigerated ripen from the centre out – they go soft and brown in the centre and develop a floury flavourless texture. The best way to handle pears is to put them in the refrigerator with stalks intact and bring them to room temperature a few days before needed. Many varieties will store up to 8 months in the fridge because they like the cold and high humidity (85-90%) provided by refrigeration. Usually the longer pears have had the cold treatment the faster they ripen at room temperature. Ready ripe pears have some give when pressed in the neck area. Pears that develop a gritty texture indicate nutritional stress of the tree and is not a varietal characteristic.

Processing. When you have quantities larger than can be accommodated in the fridge both apple and pear pieces can be dried, preserved in a sugar syrup or frozen. It is not necessary to pre-treat fruit when freezing, simply slice onto a metal baking sheet lined with baking paper and freeze as quickly as possible. The frozen pieces can be then transferred to a freezer bag and used in cooking in the same way that you would use the fresh fruit. It is not necessary to thaw the fruit, just allow a slightly longer cooking time for pies etc.

The last word. The newly available dwarf fruit trees that grow only 2-3 metres allows several varieties to be grown in the space normally taken by a standard size tree. They are a management delight not only in the garden (ease of pruning and netting) but also in the kitchen where the benefit of the small trees is most apparent at harvest. Having good sized fruit in moderate quantities that comes successively from different varieties takes away the awful stress of too much fruit at one time. It also gives greater opportunity of exploring different tastes and culinary uses.

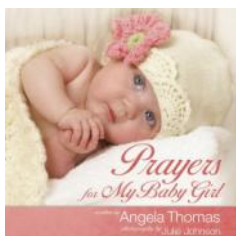
Welcome to a new baby girl Paige Nichol who arrived at Cooma Hospital on 28th March.
