Exciting discovery of Spot-tailed Quolls in East Gippsland

Two rare and threatened Spot-tailed Quolls have been discovered in the Bendoc region in East Gippsland.

Spot-tailed Quolls are the largest carnivorous marsupial on mainland Australia, they are easily identified by their brown coats, with conspicuous white spots over their body and tail. The species is currently classified as endangered on mainland Australia.

The detections are only the second time the species has been found in over five years of Vic Forests pre-harvest surveys.

Dr Chela Powell, Manager, Biodiversity Research & Development for Vic Forests said this discovery is very significant as detections of these animals have been quite rare in recent years across East Gippsland.

"This is an exciting find. We captured images of what appears to be two different Spot-tailed Quolls on remote, infra-red cameras during one of our targeted pre-harvest fauna surveys. "Before this discovery there had only been one sighting in over five years of pre-harvest surveys by across the East Gippsland region," Dr Powell said.

Vic Forests ensures that important biodiversity values, including threatened species such as Spot-tailed Quolls, are identified and appropriately protected from timber harvesting operations.

This includes engaging independent ecologists to conduct targeted surveys in areas planned for harvest on sites which are most likely to contain threatened species.

"When a Spot-tailed Quoll is detected in an area planned for harvest, VicForests works with the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) to create a Special Management Plan to protect the animal from any harvesting operations.

"The area that contains the most ideal habitat for the species is reserved and excluded from harvesting operations," Dr Powell said.

The planning stage of any harvesting operation is a long and detailed process that can take over a year to complete.

"Targeted threatened species surveys are part of our planning process that is undertaken before any harvesting operations occur.

"The Spot-tailed Quoll plays an ecologically important role as Victoria's largest native predator." Dr Powell said.

Vic Forests is committed to managing state forest to protect important forest habitat and to regrow the forest after harvesting to allow threatened species persistence in the long-term.







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Everything Depends on the Weather

I have a real interest in the history of food and often wonder how my life would have been had I lived in Europe before the explorers to Asia and the New World brought back the new crops. Can you imagine life without beans, potatoes, tomatoes, chillies, corn, apricots, peaches, bananas, broccoli, pepper and spices to mention just a few.

This year I bought new strawberry plants and they have barely grown a few leaves because it has been so wet and this means the ground is cold. As detailed in previous articles plant growth is controlled by soil temperature and this is why we need to be judicious with mulching in our climate as it can retard soil warming in Spring. Mulch is very useful to retain soil water in Summer, provided the soil is deep watered not just splashed over the mulch layer. (The other use of mulch is to suppress weeds – another big topic).

Back to strawberries – in Europe the native strawberry (*Fragaria vesca*) produces tiny but intensely flavoured fruit over a very short season. It was only in the mid 1300's that plants were taken from the wild and cultivated in the garden

of French Royalty. In the 1600's the North American (*F. virginiana*) was introduced and spread rapidly via home garden culture. The big leap forward came in 1712 again in France when an introduction from West Coast of South America (*F. chiloensis*) accidently crossed with the by now well-established East Coast North American *virginiana* type. These cross cultivars are now known as *Fragaria* × *ananassa*. This is only a simplified history of today's strawberry varieties that have the familiar large fruit as there are more natural species present.

But there is more to understand.

Fruit size still depends both on the position of the flower in the bunch and how many of the tiny seeds develop on each fruit. The primary flower has 350 pistils per flower, the secondary ones about 260, and the tertiary ones about 180 so the first flower potentially produces a fruit twice the size of the third flower. However the weight of a berry is directly proportional to the number of ovules that are fertilised and that is dependent on how well they are pollinated.

The best pollinator is the European honeybee (*Apis mellifera*) and it takes about 10-16 visits over 4 days to complete the job. Bees do not particularly seek strawberry flowers because they do not produce much nectar so will preference other flowers if available. Temperature and rainfall have a marked effect on honey bee activity. Bee activity is very limited below temperatures of 13^oC with activity increasing up to around 19^oC. Bees cannot fly in rain, and in order to conserve energy reduce the number of flights per day when it is windy. Only bees from strong hives will fly at low temperatures hence the concern about the insidious effects of agricultural chemicals.

So the wet windy and cool Spring this year is depressing growth and bee activity affecting not only strawberries but also the fruit trees. But on the bright side there is little frost and the short bursts of sunshine we have had proves that Spring will happen and that we can turn our thoughts to weeding and tomatoes!
