



SNOWY RIVER MARCH COMMEMORATIONS REPORT

At our last meeting there was a report from Penny Judge giving details of a meeting with Kim Templeton and the Mayor Bob Stewart in Bombala. Penny and Natalie met up with them at the Bombala Bakery to discuss what plans are in the pipeline for the proposed re-enactment of the Cooee Marches in November, 1915. Kim is mainly involved with the Cooee March which commenced in Gilgandra in November 1915. Several other Marches have already come on board, including the NSW Stockhorse Society. Kim said that the march has the support of NSW transport authorities and is strongly supported by the Police Department. The military will also support and co-operate in any way possible. The Mayor, Bob Stewart, said the Shire will co-operate with road closures, but will require at least 6 months notification, when the exact route of the march through the local area is known. There is a meeting of the Executive in Sydney on 10th September, and it is hoped that Delegate will be represented there.

In the mean time, the book is taking shape, and it is hoped to have it ready for publication in 2014. There will be another meeting of the SRM Committee on September 24th and anyone interested is very welcome to attend.

SUCCESS AS A GREYHOUND TRAINER

Philip Reed, a former local, who receives the "Doings" each month has sent us the following article from the Greyhound Weekly about John Callaughan who moved from the area with the rest of his family in the 1960's.

"I was living at St Marys in western Sydney, so in 1973 took up training greyhounds, with the first good one I had being "Gee Tee's Mistake," who had some great battles with the Harold Park star "Wicked Wilson" in the 300 races at Richmond. Then I got Callasue, who ran second to National Lass in the NSW final of the Distance Championship, and represented NSW interstate in the grand final. I loved racing the old Penrith track, and in 1992 had the thrill of sharing the trainers' premiership with Ken Staines and the late Allen Wheeler. In 1982 we moved to Luddenham, so I switched back to thoroughbred training and while I didn't train any city winners we had success for 12 years at places like Hawkesbury, Kembla Grange, Canberra and Bathurst. I was a bookmaker at the dogs at Harold Park and Wentworth Park in the 1980's. I used to punt big too, it was nothing for me to have up to \$2000 on one, but these days I don't gamble at all.

Seven years ago my wife Sue and I got back into the greyhounds, and I have no regrets.

I train Watto Lotto who is no champion but he is a great tryer, a really enthusiastic race dog. Two of my other dogs are faster than Watto Lotto but what makes my dog special is that he such a fantastic chaser. After every race at Wentworth Park, one of the owners buys him a couple of sausages before we head home and now when I get Watto out of the Kennels it is almost impossible to hold him, he is so keen to get those sausages."

Richmond is John Callaughan's favourite track while he rates Brett Lee, closely followed by Miata, as the best greyhounds he has seen.

John is a younger brother of successful racehorse trainer Ken Callaughan, of Goulburn.



BEES and **BIRDS**

At the time of writing it feels that we have jumped rather than slid into Spring. Flowering plums and the cherry plums are in full bloom around Delegate. This warns us that there is a window of only a few days remaining to apply a protective copper based fungicide spray to peach and nectarine trees to minimise curly leaf and brown rot in the fruit. A spray applied not later than pink bud stage is required and if flowers are more advanced it is too late this year to be effective.

However, what is already noticeable is the lack of bees working the blossoms this year. Not so long ago a tree in full bloom could be heard almost before it was seen because it was so alive with the thrum and hum of European honeybees (*Apis mellifera*) gathering pollen. It is well documented that bee numbers are in decline. Wild bee populations are increasingly affected by both disease and parasitism that reduce their normal life expectancy of six weeks. The net effect is that the workers are unable to provision as many young causing the hive population to decline steadily.

The ability of bees to resist parasites and disease is affected by many environmental factors. Like us they need a mixed diet for good health. Clearing and the intensification of agriculture continue to simplify landscapes through loss of plant species. In the small area of a bee's territory the choice of flowers has become quite restricted. There is a 'boom and bust' element operating too. The flowering of a field crop may contribute abundant pollen and nectar during just one week of the bee's life and it may literally starve through lack of alternative food sources.



In addition populations of bees that would not normally meet are being brought into contact by the new agri-industry of pollination by travelling bee hives. As the hives criss-cross continents on trucks transmission of variants of disease and parasitic organisms is rapid. The need to hire bees for specific pollination tasks has emerged only because resident bee populations that once reliably performed pollination services have succumbed to declining environmental conditions.

Honey bees are not the only pollination option. Australia has about 1500 species of native bees. Most of these are tiny and are far more effective at pollinating small and complex flowers. They are often solitary and collect just enough pollen to provide for their own young. They are often mistaken for flies but can be differentiated in that bees have four wings and flies only two.

Not all native bees are small. Pollination is effected by two methods – either direct contact or vibration that causes pollen to shed freely. The larger bees tend to vibrate pollen and they are useful in the still air of glasshouses especially for crops normally wind pollinated. The native blue banded bee (*Amegilla cingulate*) is being bred for this purpose. They are occasionally seen in Delegate and they are beautiful with their aqua blue stripes. In gardens bees and other beneficial insects can be encouraged and supported by providing a succession of flowers. In the broader landscape the key is re-instituting biodiversity in plant life. How wonderful it would be if all those native plants that formerly grew here could be seen again in our streets and paddocks. There is so much opportunity for revegetation in our area and this was brought home to me forcefully during a recent visit to Albury where the city was alive with birds through the dedicated conservation of mature trees in developments and the new plantings in all commercial and suburban areas.

Spring domestic firewood collection season opens on September 1st

The Spring 2013 Firewood Collection Season will open across Victoria at the beginning of this month (Sunday 1/9/13). Department of Environment and Primary Industries (DEPI) Statewide Land and Fire Coordinator Rob Price said: "We want to remind people that, from the 1st of September 2013, designated firewood collection areas will open after being closed during winter."

"Once these sites are open it will be legal for people to collect firewood for domestic use on public land until the Spring Firewood Collection Season ends on November the 30th 2013," Mr Price said.

"Anyone wanting to collect firewood during the Spring Firewood Collection Season should be aware that designated firewood collection areas may be closed for various reasons including because the supply in that area has already been exhausted, fire danger, flooding and other conditions determining safe access to tracks and forest."

"Access to parks and state forests for firewood collection in some parts of Victoria will be subject to flooding and wet weather conditions. People are advised to check the DEPI website to see what's open before they travel."

DEPI and Parks Victoria staff will be patrolling parks, forests and reserves to ensure people are doing the right thing.

Firewood collection is only permitted during designated times of the year and from designated firewood collection areas. Firewood collected at these sites is for personal use only and can't be sold. Official signs will display the rules and collection limits.

Typical on the spot fines are around \$577. Offences that go to court may be liable for fines up to \$7218, one year imprisonment or both.

Publican of the rambling brick Delegate Hotel, Ver-non ("Tiny") Preston report-ed that beer sales were down two 18-gallon kegs on aver-erage consumption.

rage consumption.

The town's half dozen or so shops suffered. Delegate, the centre of a rich grazing area for 50 miles around, saw few farmers during the three weeks.

Said Mrs Jean Manning, the owner of one shop: "Our town is not the busiest in N.S.W. But during the height of the outbreak there wasn't a car in sight in the main street."

Dr Balzer, a chain-smoking 30-year-old from Sydney, found time to work out that he handed out 4,000 penicillin tablets and asked 150 people to bend over for injections of the antibiotic.

The weekly "Bombala Times," which circulates Times," which circulates in Delegate, won praise from Dr Balzer for publishing a warning and the symptoms of the fever.

Part of the warning:
"Infection is spread by direct contact such as kissing."

There is no record of how effective that warning was.

Dr Balzer, at the peak of the epidemic, had 85 people, mostly children, through his surgery in one day.

300 people a day treated

Working a 17-hour day, he treated more than 300

people.

The phone ran hot in his house.

Said Balzer, mother of three boys, aged between 2 and 4—all of whom luckily escaped the fever: "The phone was the worst. It never stopped."

Dr Balzer said: "But there wasn't a phone call

that not was Country people are like

"They don't call a doctor unless they really need him. In fact my problems were increased a bit by this."

"I had to find everyone who had even slight symptoms so that I could give them a penicillin treat-ment that would stop them being carriers.

"The worry was that people with only a slight fever might not call me."

At the hospital Matron Aldridge worked close to 20 hours a day. The 14 beds were supplemented by cots so that 17 people were crammed in at one stage.

Many of the hardest hit children were in a delirium. They needed constant nurs-

Married nurses to the rescue

To the hospital's assistance came the town's biggest medical asset: 23 nurses, all former sisters at Delegate hospital, who have married and settled in the district district.

Most of theo came into town to help out. Though most townspeople were unaware of it the scarlet fever germ carried a much more grim threat than a commonplace childhood sickness.

It can also cause rheumatic fever and a heart complaint,

One young girl is in a Sydney hospital with suspected rheumatic fever. Two others are under observation in Delegate with the heart complaints.

But yesterday public health authorities believed they could declare the campaign a victory.

Dr Balzer said: "At one stage there were not enough hours in the day. "But now it's nearly over

I feel I can say it was interesting.

"As an experiment in a public health campaign it was invaluable."
