## **IMPROVED HEALTH SERVICE.**

Heather Fairfax, Acting Nurse Manager for Delegate and Bombala Hospitals met with members of the Progress Association on the 12th. March to inform them of the new arrangements for the Emergency Department in Delegate and for Medical Officers for Bombala Hospital.

Commencing immediately there will be 24/7 Emergency Services by trained staff at the Delegate MPS. The triage nurse will assess everyone who comes to the Emergency Department at Delegate MPS for treatment. If you are assessed as having an illness or injury that is potentially not serious or less urgent, the triage nurse may offer you treatment under nurse Delegate Emergency Model of Care.

The nurses, Barbara Tiernan and Lucinda Ingram who obtained over 1000 signatures to present to local member John Barilaro were also pleased to learn that 100,000 had been allotted for equipment for both hospitals.

Also good news for the whole district is that Bombala will have a full time doctor for the next two years which will see services at Bombala Hospital restored. The new Doctor will be able to live rent free in the house which the Bombala Council originally built as Doctor housing.

The model of Nurse Delegated Emergency Care was developed by nurses and doctors in the Hunter New England Local Health District and piloted at Walcha Multi-Purpose Service. The success of NFDEC at Walgett has resulted in it being adopted by Emergency Departments across NSW.

## **NEW EXHIBITION OPENING IN BUNDIAN GALLERY**

The new exhibition by artist Cheryl Davison will be officially opened by Councillor Sue Haslingden on Friday 12th April. It will be a chance to catch up with Cheryl who will be present at the official opening. When the Bundian Gallery opened seven years ago, Cheryl's works were featured and proved very popular with patrons. Her attractive art work shown right often includes figures in the landscape.

## A YEAR IN REVIEW: DELEGATE PONY CLUB PRESIDENTS REPORT 2018

2018 has been a very busy and rewarding year. Through the year we had some member transfers and new members join the club so our membership remained relatively stable. We had a solid membership of 25 riding members and 7 non-riding members. The majority of our rallies were attended by 6 to 12 riders and a couple were been attended by considerably more.

Our July rally was held at the Campbell's property in Mila, with guest instructors Doug Peadon teaching the children the basics of Polo Crosse and Meg Williams giving a demonstration of vaulting and allowing the riders to have a turn of Darryl the Barrel. Thanks to Sinead for her effort to organise the instructors and venue for this event. We had some very positive feedback and the children thoroughly enjoyed it.

The Club applied for a grant with the Boco Rock Community Enhancement Fund and in September, learned our application was successful. We are now the proud owners of a portable dressage arena, a set of 17 sets of jump wings, 7 pairs of back stands, jump cups and a trailer to put our jump wings on. The grant also provided a substantial amount of funding toward sourcing instructors from the Paid Instructors Panel for our 2018 training day. The club also received a donation from the Sunday Sips which was used to purchase bunting in the club colours.

2018 also saw the commencement of building our cross country course. Several working bees were held which were attended by a few very committed members during pleasant and not so pleasant weather, and together we managed to construct 6 permanent jumps and one portable jump in time for the training day. The jumps look very smart and professional and are a credit to our club.

Our training day and gymkhana held on the 24<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> of November were a huge success. The grounds looked well groomed thanks to the hard work of our groundsman, Ken Neven, and the parent and children volunteers who set up all the equipment for the event, (and packed it away at the end of the day). The new bunting, dressage arena and jump wings helped make our event look very smart and I felt a strong sense of pride that we could achieve all this, given that we are a relatively small pony club. The two Delegate Pony Club trophies, The Ken Summerell Memorial Trophy and the Collins Shield were won by one of our own riders, Lydia Jamieson.

A small contingent of riders travelled to events and camps during the year. We had riders attend camps at Bega, Bungendore and Orbost. On two occasions we had teams of riders travel to Bungendore to compete in mounted games competitions. Riders did not qualify to attend the mounted games state championships but had a great deal of fun both times they attended. Riders also represented the club at the Snowy River and Cooma gymkhanas. During the month of December several riders travelled to the Nimmitabel and Adaminaby gymkhanas. At both gymkhanas, Delegate was named the best presented club. It is rewarding to see our riders out and about, enjoying themselves, and forging new friendships with riders from other clubs.

The final event of the year was our first trail ride, held at Wilson's Hut, Bendoc. The ride was attended by 18 riders, being a mix of parents and juniors as well as many non-riding members who were instrumental to the smooth running of the day. After a cold, wet start the ride went very smoothly and it was lovely to get back to camp and see smoke coming out of the chimney when many of us felt slightly damp and ready to dismount. It was a wonderful relaxing end to a very busy but rewarding year. I want to extend my sincere thanks all the members of the committee, parent and child volunteers and our riders.

## Much better than television.

Not so long ago I visited a large and beautifully maintained farm garden. It was set in a treeless sea of dry paddocks. The atmosphere was eerie and oppressive and I struggled to identify why since it was so beautiful to look at. After a time, I realised why. It was a structural garden dedicated to conifers. There was no sound or movement and very little colour. There were no swaying branches making music with the breeze, no bird song or flash of wings, no hum of busy bees and above all no butterflies. It was as silent and as solemn as WW1 War Cemetery in Europe with its manicured grass and sea of crosses. Sadly, unless we work hard and insightfully to prevent it, this is how the whole world will become - endlessly silent and colourless.

This has been forcefully brought to mind in my own little patch this year. Wanting to fill a fence line quickly whilst other plants established, I planted a row of short lived but fast Buddleia. What a visual feast of movement and colour it provided, blue banded bees, mantis, moths and tiny bats at night, butterflies by day, altogether better than TV.

However, although butterflies are so easy to attract to the garden since they are not at all fussy about the source of the nectar they feed on, the mystery is from whence they have come since the caterpillars require such a specific food sources. Take the most colourful Australian butterfly, the Jezebel (*Delia harpalyce*), its larvae feed only on mistletoe and there are not many of those close to Delegate. I had quite a few of those and I saw the cabbage white (*Pieris rapae*) chasing them away from the flowers. That is something else we do not usually appreciate, how territorial butterflies can be and protective of their food source. The white butterfly is an introduced pest but there is a bit of entertainment value in checking out the boys from the girls by the spots on the forewings.

The most commonly seen was the Meadow Argus (*Junonia villida*), which is more understandable since the larvae have adapted to the garden plants snapdragon, verbena, portulaca and plantain weed. The largest

and most spectacular was the Tailed Emperor (*Polyura sempronius*). Since its larvae can exist on wattle, elms and crepe myrtle it was surprising that I saw only one. The adults are very unusual in that they draw nutrition from fermenting sap and fruit. Mine was attracted to fallen apples.

There was only one Citrus butterfly (*Princeps aegeus*), a female luckily. Now munching through a potted cumquat, its caterpillar is changing size and colouring by the day – it starts imitating a bird dropping and develops into a green, blue spotted beauty – so much better than TV!

The Delegate Public School recently held an “Under the Sea” day, and pupils participated in exploring the theme as well as dressing up. The teachers joined in the fun and from all accounts had as much fun as the children.

## EULOGY JOHN JONES (Flatout)

Flatout, Dad, Pop, Johnny

John Edward Jones was born 23 January 1935. He was the youngest of 8 children to Bert and Dorothy Jones. His siblings were Ellen, Vince, Jean, Beatrice, Josephine, Rose and Maureen.

Our heartfelt thoughts and prayers are with you Rose (Auntie Rosie) who is sadly the last remaining member of the family.

Bert gave Dad the nickname FLATOUT when he was quite young – we think around the age of 3 or 4. Apparently he used to run around with his arms extended in “flight mode” singing out “here I come Flatout!” The name stuck and everyone called him Flatout, except for his 6 sisters and his mum who insisted on calling him Johnny. Flatout went to school behind here. He was baptized, confirmed, married and now laid to rest in this church.

His father Bert took him out of school at 14 and sent him to the Harry Plant Stables in Sydney in the hope of him becoming a jockey.... Unfortunately, he put on too much weight. Despite never riding a winner, he spent the rest of his life trying to back one.

Returning home from Sydney he had various jobs around the area, but Mum reflects that he loved the many years he worked for ‘The Risk’ aka Keith Guthrie at “Berrida”. Dad and Mum always said he was a great boss. Flatout also enjoyed the time spent working for William and Hilda Roberts at “Tooralloo”. After many years at “Berrida” it was onto the Bombala Shire Council until retirement.

Flatout met Mum, Joan, at a Bombala/Delegate interschool picnic at Little Plains, half way between Delegate and Bombala. They married in 1957 and now have 7 children, 16 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren as listed on the Order of Service.

Let’s talk about Flatout the person. It’s no doubt he was a character.

King of the one liner.

Renowned for his unfathomable dry wit. His usual response to “How you going Flatout?” was “nah just steady” or “First wool truck”.

I remember when he had one of his many scans at the Canberra Hospital. We had a bit of a walk through the hospital corridors to get to the right place. Dad was pretty unsteady on his feet and using a walking stick. As the hospital corridors have railing either side to hang on to I suggested “Dad why don’t you walk along the railing?” He stopped, looked at me and said “Well, I’m never going to get up there” with that cheeky Flatout



grin because he knew he'd said something funny. I said to him, "You've still got it then".

Flatout was passionate about his footy. He played for the Delegate Tigers from the early 1950's to 1962. Even after he had sustained a head injury which put him in St Vincent's Hospital in Sydney to have three clots removed from his brain, he returned to playing. But it was a broken leg in a match against Cooma that ended his playing days. Although he had retired from playing he continued to get the best player award at Tigers' home games in his role as linesman. I'm sure there are many of you here today who can vouch for this. We did get his eyes tested and apparently they're fine.

Flatout was also an avid lifelong Bulldogs supporter. However, in later life he'd only watch their games if they were winning and Mum says would often go to bed mid game in disgust.

It's also pretty well known around these parts that Friday night was Euchre night at the Club with life long mates, Scrub, Clearo and Flynny. Renigging, the Bendy Shuffle, catching each other out for a shout or trying to clear the sprig bar with a bad odour (I leave that one to your imagination). But they loved it and would play for hours, if not days.

If you don't know what the Bendy Shuffle is, we will have a deck of cards available later at the wake where Scrub and Flynny will demonstrate... or maybe not – Sorry to drop you in it guys

Flatout was a legend – known far and wide. Testament to this is many years ago my late husband and I, before we were married, went on a winery tour around the Hunter Valley. The first winery we went into the man conducting the wine tasting asked where we were from.

John replied, "Sydney". I said, "You'd never have heard of it". "Try me" he replied. I said "Delegate".

To which he said, "36ksm south of Bombala. So you're not an Ingram or a Crawford". "Jones", I said. He gasped "Flatout Jones, halfback, Christ he was fast". My John was in awe – he hadn't even met my Dad.

The wine man gave us a huge discount on our wine purchases and a bottle of port to take home to Flatout. Pretty happy with what we scored, John looked at me and said, "Do you think they'll know him at the next one?"

In August 2015 Flatout began his long and sometimes very undignified battle with cancer.

He was on a downhill run from that day – he was never the same. He'd lost the "Flatout spark".

To say Flatout was a character is an understatement and I'm sure you all have your own Flatout story – please share these with one another today and celebrate the life of Dad, Pop, Johnny.

## DELEGATE DUCK RACE

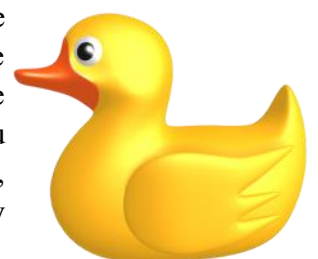

### MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID COURSE

A Mental Health First Aid Course was recently held at Delegate on 26<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup> March. This standard course increases the awareness of the signs and symptoms of common and disabling mental health problems, how to provide initial help, where and how to get professional help and how to provide first aid in a crisis situation. The course covered the more common problems such as anxiety, depression and substance use as well as crisis situations, aggressive behaviors, traumatic events, severe effects from alcohol or other drug use and suicide thoughts and behaviors.

The course was conducted by Rural Adversity Mental Health Program and brochures on where to access professional health or advice are available at the Delegate RTC. The course was well attended by approximately 15 people who all agreed that it was most helpful and informative
