# USE IT OR LOSE IT

Use and strengthen your muscles or as you grow older or you will lose mobility will be the theme for the next Health Expo, following a very successful Falls Prevention day held at the Delegate Country Club on Wednesday 18th. April. Falls do not only occur in advanced age and often result in injury and trauma, so there is a suggestion that the next Expo will aim to encourage people in a slightly younger age group to attend. Everyone can benefit from learning how to do simple daily exercises to strengthen all their muscles and improve balance and mobility.

Exercise physiologist Kate Greenwood was the first speaker following morning tea and she gave a most interesting and valuable talk and demonstration of how people can improve their balance and mobility by practising a range of simple exercises daily. She said it is amazing how much benefit and improvement she sees in clients who carry out this simple exercise regime. This is something that can be confirmed by those who are regularly attending the Heart Moves Classes. It was noted that all present, even those with walking aids were all attempting to do the exercises. Kate said that although walking is a valuable exercise which should be followed by all who are able, it does not strengthen the particular muscles which help to maintain balance and mobility and thus prevent falls.

Stephanie from Country Mobility Trends Aids then demonstrated the many and varied aids available to help around the home and out and about. As well as selling walking aids, wheelchairs etc. they also rent them out, and have their business set up at Polo Flat in Cooma where the various aids are on display.

Two pharmacists were present and a 4th year student gave an informative talk emphasising the importance of being aware of taking medication as prescribed and regularly checking with your Doctor or Pharmacist if problems arise. She emphasised that before taking any over the counter medication even vitamins etc it is important to check that these do not react with other medications. Those present were then invited to ask questions, which many took advantage of.

Following a lovely light lunch provided by the ladies of the Country Club and served by Lana Jamieson, Cynthia Dolan gave a demonstration of Tai Chi for Arthritis and showed how many of the simple movements can be carried out by those with limited mobility.

Unfortunately two of the speakers were unable to attend, but those present went away well satisfied, feeling they had learned valuable information.

Initiatives by the NSW Government, the Australian Government, Department of Veteran's Affairs, and the Department of Health and Ageing are encouraging people to stay active, strengthen their muscles to prevent falls and the serious consequences which can follow.

The day was presented by Monaro Active and Healthy Living—connecting Youth and Communities and Bombala Council, made possible by Monaro Rural Health Service and funded by the Department of Health and Ageing.

# Upgrade of SDE's Depot Facilities

The Department of Sustainability and Environment (DSE) is working on a significant upgrade of its depot facility at Bendoc, one of the most remote DSE work centres in the state.

DSE's Regional Director for Gippsland, Mike Timpano said DSE is committed to a presence in Bendoc to support public land management and the community.

"This project will provide the local area with a new sustainable facility and an economic boost to the community during the construction phase.

"The improvements to the depot are part of a master plan for the Bendoc site and will provide modern, safe and user-friendly facilities for staff and add value to the local community."

The current Bendoc depot facility has been in operation for approximately 22 years, but there has been a land management office there for at least 70 years.

"This demonstrates DSE's commitment to the Bendoc community," Mr Timpano said.

"Bendoc is a designated Level 3 Incident Control Centre for emergency response and these new facilities will create a better work environment for permanent, seasonal and visiting crews involved in fire-fighting and fire preparedness."

Local DSE staff were consulted about the works to ensure the upgrade would be suitable for DSE's and the local community's needs. This consultation provided valuable feedback which has influenced the final design.

Mr Timpano said the design for the Bendoc depot was based on the 'Australian shed' style.

"The design incorporates sustainable environmental features including high level natural lighting, passive cross ventilation, solar hot water, bio-swales, natural flora and water storage capacity sufficient for a water neutral site," he said.

"The new design uses the latest in innovation, it allows for water run-off into the ground without obstruction which is particularly good for the snow conditions that Bendoc faces. It also incorporates the latest in storage facilities for dangerous goods and is one of the first developments in DSE's roll-out to have such a facility."

DSE Bendoc staff are excited about their new depot facilities and agreed that the development will provide a safe, modernised work environment.

Mr Timpano said DSE is pleased to be working on such an important project for the Bendoc community.

"This new development involves the latest in design, sustainability and performance principles and we are confident that the local community will be pleased with the end product," he said.

The project is currently in tender phase, with construction expected to commence in early June 2012.

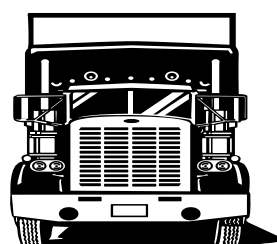

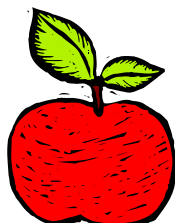

## DELEGATE ANNUAL DUCK RACE

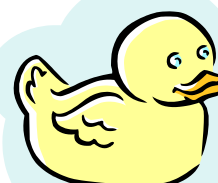
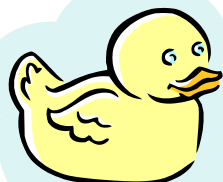
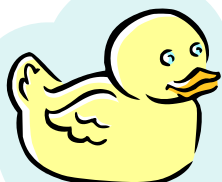

## Writer's Festival – Bombala

What an inspiring day!

There was standing room only at the Bombala Railway Buildings on Saturday 21<sup>st</sup> April for the inaugural Writer's festival, a day when we could listen to established writers from Canberra and the Blue Mountains.

Participants were treated to a feast of poetry, short stories and a short film, as well as being tempted by display of books written or published by the writers in attendance.

Each of the writers spoke briefly about their experience with writing and the various journeys along the publishing trail. It was wonderful to hear such a variety of writing styles, from the serious to the bizarre and to be able to communicate your responses directly to the author.

The writers participating in the day were

**Laurence Anderson** a writer, ex-doctor and film director from Canberra. Laurence read excerpts from his novel *The Redeemed* and later ran a short session on script writing for film and showed a short film *The Yowie* which won prizes at the Los Angeles Film Festival.

**Larry Buttrose** writer of short stories and poetry. Larry from the Blue Mountains, runs university courses in creative writing. Larry ran a session on writing and how to get started.

**Chris Mansell** Chris from the South Coast read poetry from several of her anthologies

**Graciella Mc Namara** Graciella is visiting from Argentina. She read poetry of her countrymen and some of her own poetry. She is currently writing a novel

**Laurence and Graciella** then read a poem *Cambodia* by Norman Abjorenson from Canberra who was absent due to illness

**Geoff Page** from Canberra. Geoff read a wide variety of entertaining material from several of his anthologies

**Richard Tipping** Richard from Canberra entertained us with a tune on the Jews Harp and then showed some of his visual art work which works with words and read several of his poems

**David Vernon** David is a publisher with his own company Stringybark Publishing. He read from two of his published anthologies which feature the work of entrants in the Stringybark Writing Awards. These anthologies were titled *Marngook* and *The Road Home*

Over lunch and afternoon tea provided by the Bombala Council, participants had ample opportunity to talk with these talented people, a rare opportunity indeed.

Hopefully this will be the first of many of these festivals.

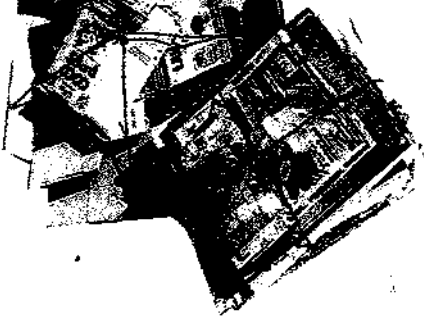

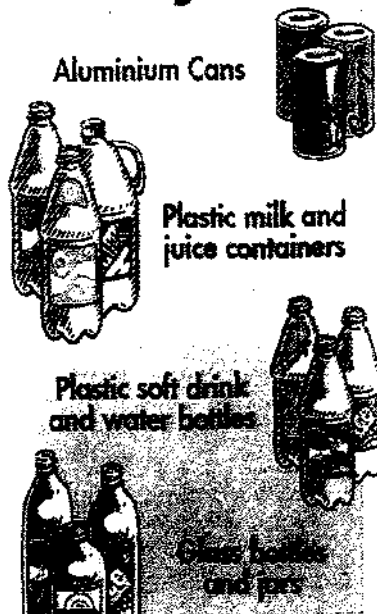

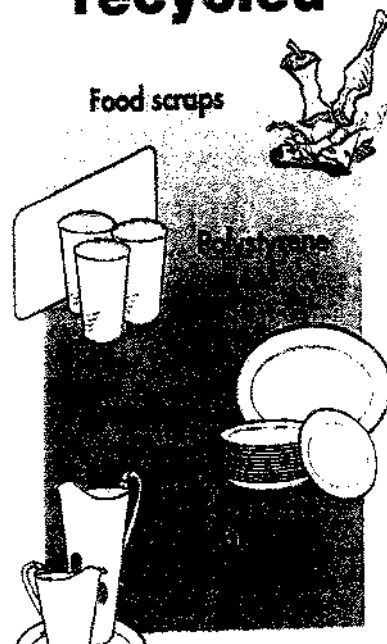

*Rural areas are already connected by satellite, and in 2015 when the NBN Satellite goes up they will connect through that.*

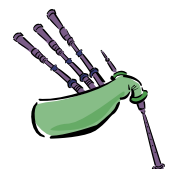
