

Kay Saarinen—One of the guest speakers at the International Women's Day Luncheon.

Kay Saarinen was a vivacious speaker at the luncheon, who gave a humorous account of her life on an organic farm at Wyndham. She and her husband Greg, purchased a 40acre block at Wyndham 20 years ago and started a Permaculture system, built a straw bale home and created a certified organic veggie garden. After a few years of barely making a living, Greg went back to his trade and Kay stayed on to try a make a living from the land. They turned to growing herbs and six years later, when their daughter was born with eczema Kay used her skills as a Naturopath to make an ointment from herbs,

which turned out to successfully cure the complaint. After trying herbal remedies out on a few friends, Kay went to the market where they were a hit. So, Saarinen Organics was born and as the business grew. they were able to employ workers and husband Greg was able to give up outside work and came back to work on the farm.

Unfortunately, the bushfire two years ago took out most of their farm, with the house and lab surviving and are only now returning to some semblance of normality. Kay said it was heartbreaking to see all those years of building drying rooms, irrigation, herbs and fencing all destroyed.

Theirs is a story of hard work and survival and hopefully for them continued success with their herbal remedies, which we understand will soon be available at the Old Post Office shop in Delegate.



Paula Bauer:

After working in varied occupations, in different countries, during which she had to deal with gender bias and less remuneration than her male colleagues, Paula Bauer came to Australia at the age of 28 with two failed marriages behind her. She continued to travel and by the age of 30 had travelled on 6 continents, mainly South America and South Africa, roughing it as she went. She met and married her husband Pete at the age of 40. They bought a property of 42 acres near Canberra and she worked at consulting in the ACT, managing IY contracts between the Federal Government and IBM. When their business lost work they changed to home improvements and Paula studied interior design to help out. When that business failed, they auctioned the property and put their furniture in store, spending 6 months camping and moving around, working on cattle stations. It was during this time that they bought 500 acres of native bush at Badja, moving there in 2009 after a detour to Tasmania to care for her Mother-in law. To supplement their income, she commenced writing books and has published one book every year. Unfortunately, her husband died of cancer in 2018 and she found herself tackling everything on the block – chain sawing firewood, changing oil in the generator, etc. all jobs her husband

had done. While on a visit to Norway in 2020 her home and property were devastated by fire. Having heard of UNSW Bushfire Recovery project she loaded observations to I Naturalist and became their top citizen scientist. She decided to collate her observations in a book. Today she has found a new purpose in life by working with wildlife along with a number of other volunteers, mainly women.

SAVE CURRAWARNA

The public meeting in Bombala re the closing of Currawarna on Friday the 18th., saw a large crowd present, to hear from politicians Kristy McBain and Nicole Overall and representatives of Southern Cross Care. The meeting was chaired by Narelle Davies new President of the Snowy Monaro Shire. A number of locals spoke passionately about the need for the institution be kept open, with an ageing population, and the only recourse for residents to be sent to neighbouring towns, distances away from families. Representatives from Southern Cross Care were adamant that it was not feasible to keep Currawarna open, listing a number of reasons, which were received with some skepticism by those present. Councilor Bob Stewart addressed the crowd saying it was worst decision made by a corporate entity that he had ever seen and that he was disgusted with Southern Cross Care. When Narelle closed the meeting, she assured the crowd that our two local members, Kristy and Nicole were working together to find a solution. Narelle Davis said that the council's priority is to ensure that there is a viable aged care sector across the entire Snowy Monaro. It was announced over the ABC Bega, that six of the residents could be moved to Delegate, but this does not appear to have happened yet. As Mayor Davis said, with the coming election, Aged Care needs to be front and centre of our demands to Government.

STAFFING SHORTAGES STILL CAUSING PROBLEMS AT THE MPS

Some members of the Delegate Progress Association were invited to the Delegate MPS for an update on Staffing and other matters pertaining to the local Multi Purpose Service.

Staffing continues to be a huge problem throughout the State and the local MPS is at present, entirely dependent on Agency Staff for the provision of Registered Nurses. Advertisements for more staff have been placed and management are hopeful, but not confident, that they may get one permanent Registered Nurse. In the meantime, the employment and training of Assistants-in Nursing is going ahead, with one position being filled and another position being on-boarded.

The closing of Currawarna has exacerbated the problem, with most of the residents there having to be moved further afield. The Bombala Community are hopeful another provider will take it over, but there are still many hoops to jump through.

The proposed downgrade of the Delegate Emergency Department will still take place, and this may help with staffing as many Registered Nurses are not comfortable dealing with emergency situations. However, the wheels of Government turn very slowly, which does nothing to help with an immediate staff shortage.

There are proposals to offer more visiting services to the local MPS, but as Chairman of the Community Consultative Committee, Rhonda Linehan, pointed out, this has been difficult to arrange in the past as lack of numbers is always brought up as an excuse not to visit small facilities.

Should the Staff shortage continue to become a major hurdle at the Delegate MPS one proposal is to build an extra wing on to the Bombala MPS to provide Aged Care Accommodation for an extra 20 district beds. At the moment these are just ideas being tossed around and representatives from Health will again visit to update the community in the next few weeks or months.

Aged Care has long been neglected by successive Governments and the present staff shortage is biting hard, particularly in small communities such as ours.

People are scrambling to find places for their loved ones in other areas, which has not been easy. Despite a royal commission, there has been nothing done to improve aged care services, and this is being particularly felt in rural areas, which are lagging behind in all health services.

We have been enjoying some lovely autumn weather of late, but a cold change is about to hit the area, It has been a summer of very changeable weather, and we will soon be using our heaters full time.



The Bombala Show which as it turned out was held on the same week-end as the cancelled campdraft also enjoyed good crowds and good weather. Unfortunately the campdraft had to cancel the week before, because the showground was very wet and it was unfortunate that the two events coincided, but the Campdrafts are so popular, they have a calendar of dates for these events.



SRMC new Mayor, Narelle Davies has had a very busy initiation into her job, visiting the many local events and local communities. She also chaired the Save Currawarna public meeting and has vowed to continue fighting to restore an Aged Care Facility at Currawarna.

In good news for the residents of the Border area, the sealing of the last remaining 10kms the Bonang is in it's final stages of planning and approval. It will involve the removal of native vegetation, but have embedded ecologists into the proposal to reduced environmental impacts and reduce the amount of sediment entering nearby waterways. Th sealing of this section has been a long time coming.

Some of the Maple trees in Delegate's main Street are beginning to turn to their autumn colours. There are some maples in nearby Memorial park as well, and it will be a great sight in Autumn especially as the trees mature.

BEAT THE PRICE RISES – Grow your own

Famine has always accompanied war, and although Ukraine is far away, Ukraine's contribution to global food security is so great that it is already affecting Australia's food pricing. It is a major supplier of grain and vegetable oils – its emblem flower is the Sunflower after all. Already the price of wheat has risen by \$100 per tonne affecting our dairy, chicken meat, eggs, pork and grain fed beef. Closer to home we have the persistent flooding of our major vegetable producing areas that has wiped out winter crops and that will now take seasons to fully recover.

There is a general reluctance in this district to have a cool season vegetable garden which is strange since so many of our staple foods come from climates colder than ours and although slow growing during winter, are frost proof.

There are so many vegetables that grow happily in autumn and winter here producing an abundance in early spring when summer crops are months off. The big advantage of a winter garden is that the major pests are asleep. Below is a list of what can be started now.

The quickest to produce is the Asian leafy greens group. Pak choi makes a crisp delicious salad leaf along with young beetroot leaves. Broad bean growing tips can be harvested all winter and cooked, the pods coming in spring. The outstanding vegetable for cold weather is English Spinach. The onion family also gives many varied meal opportunities from soup to tarts and they can be grown in little spaces between shrubs. Radishes are usually thought of as salad food in Australia but are added to stews throughout Europe.

Cabbage and Cauliflower are longer term prospects but keep well especially if refrigerated. Roasted garlic produces a mild silky spread that serves as a butter substitute for savoury sandwiches.
