

The Delegate Progress Association have been successful in obtaining a grant through the Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Fund to help with ensuring our community remains vibrant and resilient. The grant totalling \$686,755 will see much needed additional accommodation options for visitors, contract workers and when needed emergency personnel, the establishment of Discovery Centre which will focus tourism development in the village and the contracted employment of an Indigenous Project Officer to assist with the roll out of the Bundian Way in the immediate area.

The Discovery Centre will host a program of workshops, allow for specialised displays depicting both historical Indigenous and European history as well as current day projects, and act as the booking office for Bundian Way tours and activities in the Delegate Node . Some of the planned displays will be permanent features while others will be developed for specific events and to celebrate particular aspects of the life and times within the vil-

lage or to support the workshop program.

The additional accommodation will include three new huts modelled on the cattleman huts of the high country and are sure to be popular with visitors wanting an unique experience in our historic village. Also include in the project are some minor improvements at the Nurses Cottage and the Old Bank Flat and the remodeling of the surgery at the old Doctors House to create a two bedroom self contained flat.

#### DELEGATE BIN ENCLOSURE TO RE-OPEN 3<sup>rd</sup> AUGUST.

Council has put out a second release regarding the bin enclosure at the Delegate Tip stating that the facility would be re-opening on 3<sup>rd</sup> August. Their first Media Release merely stated that the facility would be closing, leading users to believe that it would be closing permanently. It was in fact temporarily closed for cleaning purposes following the dumping of needles and a mattress with blood on it. Council will be monitoring the facility and further illegal dumping and misuse, may result in the facility being closed to the public.

Because the first message was misleading, Councillor Bob Stewart called for a meeting with the community to clear up the matter. The meeting was held at the Rural Transaction Centre on Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> July, where one Council Staff representative was present and another on a phone hook-up. Councillors Stewart and Haslingden were present, as well as members of the public, where the matter was discussed at some length.

Council staff also informed the meeting that at least four cameras placed at the bin enclosure, had been removed or rendered inoperable, so it is obvious that some people are doing the wrong thing. It is a sad blight on our society that something placed there for people's convenience is treated with such disrespect.

Therefore, it is quite obvious that such a free rubbish disposal enclosure, sitting beside a Transfer Station (Rubbish Tip) which is only open for two half days per week, where ratepayers have to pay for items placed there, is set up to fail.

- One solution would be to change to a Bank of Bins, which are locked, giving the out of town ratepayers, keys.
- Placing a camera inside the Bank of Bins, facing outward where it would catch unauthorised dumping beyond the enclosure.
- The amount of rubbish placed in the bin enclosure has increased, because it is open while the Rubbish tip (Transfer station) is only open for two half days per week.
- Costs associated with the use of the rubbish tip have increased drastically and there are those who cannot afford the extra costs. For example, there are no green bins for garden waste supplied and the cost of taking green waste to the tip is becoming prohibitive.
- Council will be increasing the hours of opening for the tip itself, to Tuesday: 8am -1pm, Saturday: 9am to 1.30pm, but with costs of usage increasing, this will not solve the amount of rubbish left in the free bin enclosure

There needs to be a re-think for users in smaller villages, e.g. to get rid of a mattress and many other items, users are asked to do a 60km round trip on top of paying a fee. It should be pointed out that many people in the town do not have any means of transporting larger items. Bombala Council trialed a pick up of large items twice a year, perhaps this could be tried again.

Servicing Rural towns with small populations may present problems, but surely thinking outside the

square could produce a plan to help residents in these areas, who have a right to such basic services as rubbish removal. Also, those who are responsible for the dumping of illegal items need to be reminded that there are penalties for such behavior.

Closer to home, I shore at Delegate Station in1960, 25,000 sheep, 8 stands."

### **All About Strawberries**

I keep buying punnets of strawberries and am always disappointed to find them fairly hard and flavourless so once again I have decided to grow them myself even though I have had varying success in the past. I now realise that not all the named varieties are going to give good results here.

So first some strawberry history. Until exploration of other continents the only member of the genus in Europe was the Alpine strawberry *Fragaria vesca*. It is a tiny fruit, tedious to pick that needs to be macerated with a little sugar to release its flavour. However, in France about 1740 a plantsman made an accidental cross between the wild strawberry collected from Nth America, *Fragaria virginiana* (very similar to *Fragaria vesca*) and the much larger fruited *Fragaria chiloensis* from Chile. This cross is known as *Fragaria ananassis* and is the source of all the strawberry varieties grown today.

Some Strawberry biology. All the original strawberries were short day plants meaning that the flowers are initiated late winter and fruiting occurs for only a short season in Spring peaking in early Summer. Pollination success is critical to the shape of the fruit. Many different insects visit strawberry flowers including flies, heatles, thrins, butterflies however, o





beetles, thrips, butterflies however, only bees, especially the honey bee (*Apis mellifera*) are efficient pollinators. Unfortunately, bees are not particularly interested in strawberry flowers and this is a problem is exacerbated because the female parts develop sequentially over 7 days with each flower needing about 15 bee visits to pollinate the fruit fully. Added to this is that temperature in late winter has a marked effect on honey bee activity which is very limited below 13° C. As well in rainy conditions bees fly for very short distances and wind will reduce the number of flights per day. When a strawberry is cut open it is easy to see that each seed contributes to the development of flesh clearly demonstrating the need for all the seeds to develop for nice fruit shape. The fruits below demonstrate cold damage that occurs at -2°C and uneven seed development.

A big advance in overcoming the constraints of late winter has been the recent breeding of day neutral types that will produce flowers steadily from Oct-June. This largely overcomes the

risk of poor bee visitation, cold damage and extends the season of fruiting.

The position of the flower in the truss determines the potential size of the fruit. The first flower has many more stigmata to receive pollen than the subsequent flowers explaining why fruits become smaller on the truss and no cultivation technique will change this phenomenon.

The Victorian DPI recommends **'Alinta'** as best for home gardens due to its long season and ability to withstand summer heat. **'Lowanna'** and **'Melba'** are also day neutral and bred in Australia for consistent production over a long season. Old fashioned types will give a short heavy flush that may suit

Jam makers, best are **'Chandler'** and **'Tioga'** both sweeter than **'Red Gauntlet'**. A very new cultivar is **'Temptation**' that starts in January when most others are declining.

Many novelty types are being offered with pink or red flowers and some with white fruit (not so interesting on

Pavlova perhaps). The plants prefer a loose, slightly acid soil and will suffer if allowed to dry out. Most fruit rots can be avoided by preventing contact with soil by using an airy mulch. Production is maintained by removing runners early. In winter remove all old leaves and spray with a copper spray along with other fruit trees. Slugs, Portuguese millipedes, harlequin bugs and earwigs can all be damaging. Catch and destroy is the only option really, done as you pick fruit daily. Fruit will ripen nicely indoors so no need for it to be dead ripe before harvest which is handy in hot weather.
