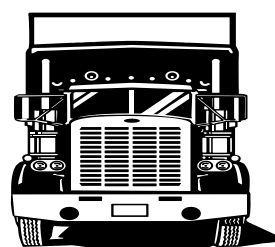

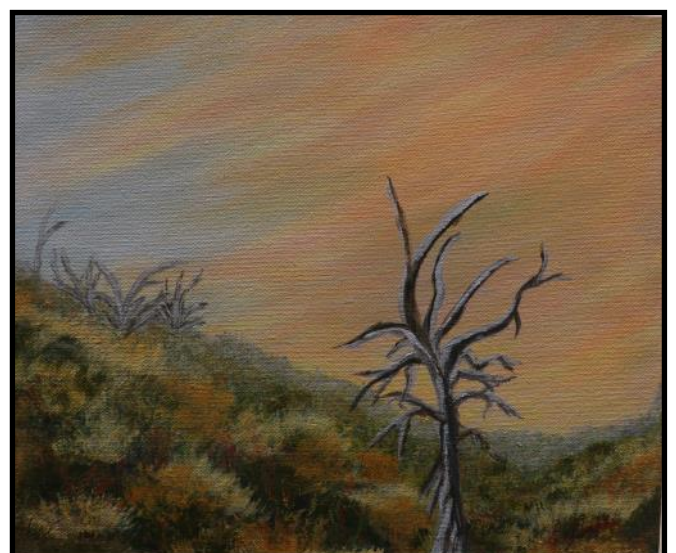

# Kitchen and Cooking



Cooking is the single largest cause of fires in the home. A fire in your kitchen can cause extensive damage to your home, but more importantly, can cause serious injuries and burns. Here's some information to help you stay safe:

## Pay Attention

- Always supervise children, keep them away from the stove top, oven and any hot or steamy surfaces or liquids
- Keep pot handles turned so children can't reach them
- Keep your cooking area clean and free from grease, dust and oil - This includes your stove top, griller, oven and range hood
- Never leave cooking unattended - If you must leave the kitchen, turn cooking appliances such as the stove, griller and microwave off
- Make sure kitchen appliances are clean and in good working order
- Tea towels and paper towels catch fire easily and must be kept away from cooking and heat sources
- Don't cook wearing clothes with loose fitting sleeves as they can catch alight if dangling over a flame
- Never use water to put out fat or oil fires - You risk serious burns and can spread the fire rapidly
- Never carry pans of hot or burning oil, this is dangerous, you could get seriously burnt and spread fire.

## Fire Extinguishers and

## Fire Blankets

You should always have a fire extinguisher and fire blanket within easy reach but away from your immediate cooking area.

Victorian Fire Services recommend that you only use a fire extinguisher or fire blanket if you know what to do and feel capable of using the equipment safely.

If a kitchen fire occurs and you don't feel confident to put it out safely, switch off the appliance (if it is safe to do so) and leave the premises immediately. Only when you are safely out of the building, call Triple Zero (000).

If able to, turn off gas and electricity at the external meter.

We have received emails from Gloria Cotterill who is on a



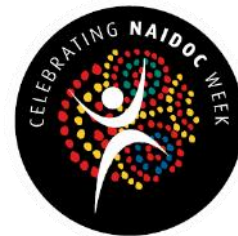

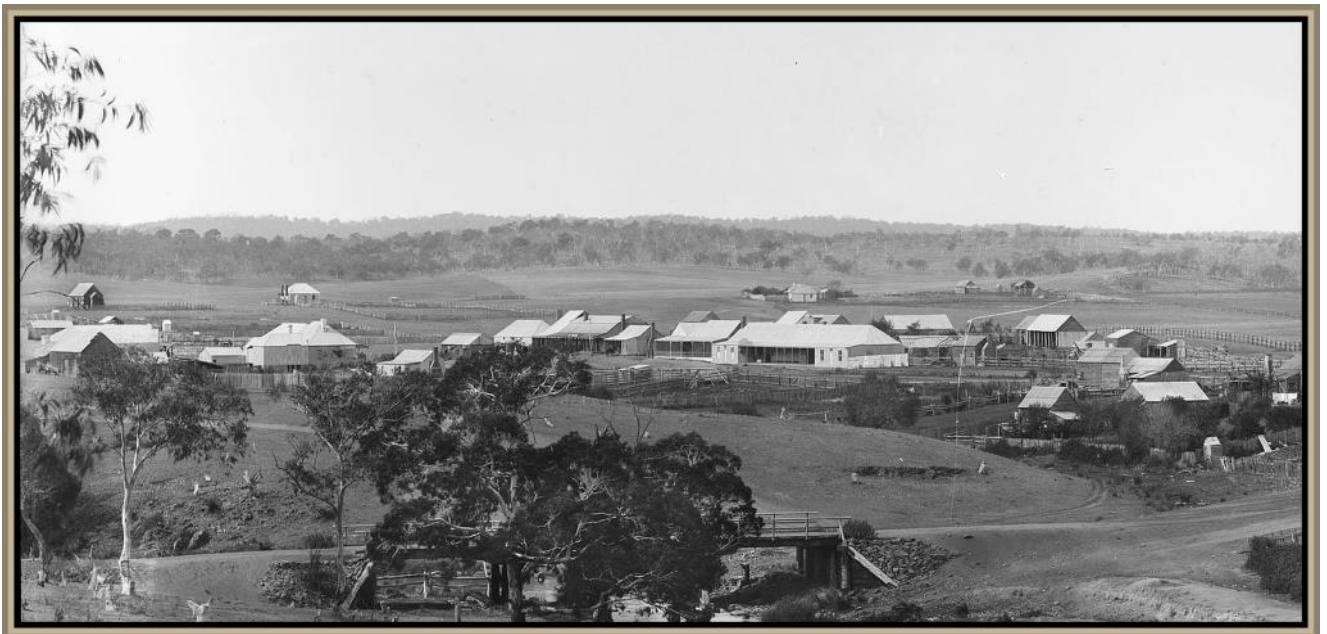


Many local schools are celebrating Naidoc week which began this week. The new Aboriginal exhibition in the Bundian Gallery will be open from Wednesday 10th July.

# LOOKING BACK



These beautiful photos of old Delegate were taken by photographer John Kerry somewhere between 1888 and 1917. The first hotel in Delegate was the Royal Hotel built by Mr James Roberts and the top photo shows the road from Corrowong and the substantial building on the right, partly obscured by a tree would be that hotel. Their washing line is shown at the end of the block, as well as the outhouse. (Always a long walk in those days). The bottom photo showing section of the main street, is more difficult to identify, but the old Commercial Hotel built in 1877, appears to be the 4th building. It was demolished in 1926 and the present day hotel was built on the site, opening in 1927. We thank David Goodyer of the Bombala News agency who is a local historian, for these great photos.

# ONIONS to eat and for the flower garden

Previous generations had a much closer affinity to the natural world than we do today and many of the old sayings illustrate this. Observations of nature were routinely used to give succinct comment on human behaviour.

Think of the slightly judgemental use of “Birds of a feather flock together” and “The fruit never falls far from the tree”. A favourite of mine is “He knows his onions” which is often accompanied by a wink and a nod. This harks back to the days when a successful store of onions was the make or break for a family’s ability to survive a European winter. Any person who achieved this was considered to have a canny sense and the “knowing” refers to the fact that the true bulbing onion (*Allium cepa*) comes in a multitude of varieties that each have a differing degree of response to daylength during growth and different storage characteristics. Some varieties naturally store well and some need to be used at harvest.

The *Allium* tribe is a large one and the bulbing onion is only one member. The tribe also includes the leek that does not respond to daylength and garlic that does so very strongly. There are also all sorts of multiplier types along the lines of French shallots that are trouble free in growth and store well. Then for greens there are the spring onions and onion or garlic chives. The onion tribe has about 750 species plus their very many cultivars. Some are ancient food plants and some are purely decorative.

The good news for Delegate district is that onions like cold weather. The long day types need to be started mid-winter which suit us as we always have plenty of bed space available then. Creamgold, Brown Spanish and Red Brunswick (pictured) are some suggestions. Seed will germinate in soil temperatures as low as 2°C but for strong, even germination it is probably better to aim for a temperature a bit higher than this. Using a seedling tray in a protected place makes sense during heavy frost because in the garden the surface soil where seed is lying freezes overnight jeopardising, or at least delaying, germination.

However, I find that I am relying more on French golden shallot divisions as they are easy to plant, produce good size bulbs that hold well both in the ground and storeroom and suit cooked and raw.

For the best heads of garlic, the cloves are also planted close to the shortest day and harvested mid-summer. However, I put in any spare cloves as they become available (i.e. sprout in the kitchen). They always produce something, often a single large bulb which has the advantage of being much less fiddly to peel.

The onion family evolved in temperate areas that are characterised by significant differences in daylength between summer and winter. Like many other plants from these regions to initiate flowering they require a critical daylength. The photoperiod for natural onion types is 16 hours and this has given rise to the old rule-of-thumb to ‘plant on the shortest day and harvest on the longest’. In tropical areas the range in daylength between seasons is not large and, at the equator, daylength is the same all year round. To grow onions in warmer climates cultivars have been bred that respond to a 12 hour day i.e. shortday types. Now if we plant shortday types at our latitude they start to initiate flowering too soon and fail to form bulbs of any useful size so stay with the older varieties.

The widely grown decorative alliums and society garlic have flowers are usually shades of lavender although some are white and a very few have yellow flowers. The flower heads form the characteristic ball topping a tall leafless stem of the onion tribe and the seeds are small, black and angular.

It is important to know that all the onion tribe are poisonous to dogs, cats, goats, pigs and horses. Even more deadly poisonous to these animals, as well as humans, are the close relatives to onions the daffodils and jonquils which is a surprise to many people.
