VOLUNTEERING

The value of Community volunteers has been put into sharp focus by the voluntary work done by the Committees for the Kennedy and Homes and the Call for Currawarna Committee Ltd, who have put so much work into the soon to be built retirement facility and re-opening the Currawarna Aged Care home. Much fund raising will be needed to make the latter a reality and there is a call to arms for the whole district to support this important project.

Big successful fund raising events in the past have been held with regularity in both Delegate and Bombala. However the sad fact of life is that volunteers are growing older or dropping off the perch and no-one is stepping forward to fill the breach. Small rural towns such as Delegate have benefited greatly in the past from local volunteer work, but the future will be bleak if the trend of losing volunteers continues. Many of the things we enjoy today are the result of someone's voluntary labour.

The Delegate Progress Association was established nearly 40 years ago, and has grown by hard work and dedication, from a small organisation to one with valuable assets which contribute to the economics of the town. They are now able to pay a cleaner and an occasional gardener and handyman, but are becoming very short of volunteers to keep the Rural Transaction Centre open. If you have a few hours to spare, or even one day per month to work there, you will be welcomed with open arms. Sharon is leaving shortly for a well-earned holiday, which makes the situation even more dire.

As well the Country Club, an important social hub for the town, depends to a large extent on volunteers. The School of Arts Committee would love someone who lives in town, to help Doreen out. The local Hospital Auxiliary who do such valuable work, would welcome more helpers as I am sure would the RSL, Campdraft, Team Penning Committees and probably more, who I may have missed mentioning.

Our local Fire Brigade, who we depend on in times of need, are in need of more members, especially from the younger age group.

UPDATE ON CURRAWARNA

At a public meeting at the School of Arts on Tuesday 25th October, representatives of the Currawarna Assisted Living Ltd and the Kennedy Homes Trust gave an update on the progress of both projects. The CEO of Sapphire Aged Care, Matt Sharp was also present. Tenders are about to be called for the building of the Kennedy Units, which are to be situated behind the Anglican Church in Bombala. It will be a Retirement Style village facility with the DA soon to be finalized. Tenders for construction will shortly be called for from local and nearby builders.

The CALL Committee have asked Federal Member Kristy McBain for Federal assistance and will also embark on a fund raising campaign to help get the project off the ground. They have asked for a sub-committee be formed for this purpose. Staffing will be accessed locally and they say they are already receiving expressions of interest and as well traineeships through the Bombala High School will be set up.

Expressions of interest are also being taken from prospective clients and with Charity status, the Committee can call for the community to buy low cost memberships. There are no legal barriers or red tape to prevent the facility opening immediately, as all that is needed is funding, and with support from all levels of Government the committee are positive that funding will come through. Meanwhile to show local support a fund raising drive will be initiated to raise \$100,000 and Kristy McBain has taken their suggestions to the Minister for Aged Care, Anika Wells and they have now formed a taskforce, who wish to meet with the Call Committee, to see how the model can be fitted into Federal aged care.

They hope to have the facility up and running in the Autumn of next year, the level of care being low level, with staff on hand to provide cleaning, washing, meals, etc. while those needing help with showering can access these services through a "Care At Home Team"

The plan is to make it affordable for all, with residents using their Aged Care Packages and Rental assistance for those who already rent, and further details can be obtained by contacting the Committee. As residents need higher medical care, they will be moved to the Bombala MPS, which has 10 aged care beds. Delegate MPS also has 10 aged care beds which are at present being fully utilized.

There is also a plan to rent out some of the rooms at the Currawarna facility which are not in use, to visiting health professionals, thus providing comfortable accommodation. Good accommodation is vital in attracting health staff., and this proposal if taken up will provide an extra revenue stream for the facility.

The shortage of General Practitioners and the lack of a permanent Doctor at the Bombala Surgery is also a major problem for Bombala and the surrounding district which extends over the Victorian Border.

All those at the meeting were impressed with the hard work and dedication of the CALL Committee and the results they have achieved so far. The fact that a local not for profit committee will be running the facility, will be a factor in it's ongoing success. Since local Boards and local management were taken out of the equation in the 1990's and the Health System centralised, rural health has gone backwards and will continue to do so unless changes are made.

As a foot note to the above, the plan for three levels of aged care in Bombala is commendable, but the fly in the ointment will be the time frame for the funding and building the 30 bed extension at Bombala Hospital. Until such time it is vital that the Delegate MPS be fully functioning as Aged Care demands are increasing and the need is becoming greater. The accommodation for Agency Nurses in Delegate has been provided up until recently, by the Delegate Progress Association, as there has been no move to do so by the GSAS. A small flat at the back of our building was made available, and when this was not available they were housed at the Nurses Cottage., which was at time inconvenient, but the need for health care was a greater priority. The Delegate Progress Association and the CCC Committee have had several meetings with Great Southern Area Health representatives about a proposal to improve outpatient and allied services in delegate. Months later we are still waiting.



Last Saturday the community of Delegate and surrounding villages came together to celebrate a significant milestone in the district's history.

After some disruptions and postponements, Delegate Public School was finally able to celebrate 150 years of continual public education on the site of the current school. Current students and staff mixed wonderfully with former students and staff of yesteryear to celebrate the sesquicentennial of this magnificent educational institution.

The Delegate Public School P&C, ably led by Mrs Jen Jeffreys, Ms Su King, Mrs Kristy Brooks and Kath Jeffreys, and school Office Manager Mrs Louise Bannister worked with the wider community to present a simply magnificent High Tea and historical photographic display.

Special Guest, Mr Keith Duran Director Educational Leadership for the Eden/Monaro Directorate spoke to the large crowd of visitors about the amazing work being carried out presently by the school and how the opportunities given to students today is much more varied than times past.

Many parents of former students were also amongst the 250 plus strong crowd on the day, with many taking the opportunity to tour the school and reflect about the changes that have taken place since their own children had attended the school. It was extremely pleasing to receive so many positive remarks and comments about the current school programs being run and the direction the school is heading in terms of what we can now offer the students of today.

Students from the 3456 Class gave a rousing dance performance to the tune of Iko Iko. This performance is part of our school's Online Dance Program Footsteps which has been highly successful across the entire K-6 School.

To kick off the High Tea, a beautiful moment occurred when the oldest living ex student in Mr Peter Jeffreys and our current youngest student in Jethro Franke were given the honours of cutting the official cake and open the High Tea. A seventy-one-year age difference in one photo summed up this outstanding day enjoyed by all.

Schooling has changed dramatically across the world since Delegate Public School opened in 1871, but now we can proudly say that not only do we offer extremely high-quality Literacy and Numeracy programs, the school now offers a highly successful Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden program in state-of-the-art facilities. Our Sporting and Physical Education programs continue to be at the forefront of all schools across the Monaro, with students in 2022 producing outstanding results in Swimming, Cross Country, Athletics, Rugby League (Boys and Girls), Soccer and Touch Football. The schools STEAM (Science Technology Engineering Art and Maths) program continues to provide student with access to the latest devices, including laptops and iPads, codable robots, 3-D printing, drones and virtual reality sets for all students. The work done by students K-6 in the STEAM space is nothing like any of the school's previous students could ever have imagined in days gone by. The school's Aboriginal programs are now also at the forefront of everything we do in the classroom and the ability of all students to reflect on the Indigenous culture that lies in Delegate and its surrounds is another fine example of the changes in our educational delivery in 2022.

After the last two or so years, when our community has been severely affected by drought, fire, COVID, NSW/Victoria border closures and now flooding rains, it was very fitting that on Saturday, the weather gods finally smiled upon us and gave us a glorious day of sunshine for the community to come out in force to celebrate as one this wonderful public institution. Added to this was the outstanding contribution of Mr Dave Whitlock and Mrs Kelly Voveris in ensuring that the school was in sparkling condition on the day.

The school would like to thank everyone for coming out and celebrating with us, and we look forward to providing amazing educational opportunities for a further 150 years and beyond.

Council Update Meeting

Mayor Narelle Davis and Chief Operations Officer, Jeff Morgan, from Snowy Monaro Regional Council visited Delegate on Tuesday night, 2 November. The Mayor, CEO of Council and Council staff had previously walked around the town with members of the community who had raised a number of issues. The meeting updated the community on the progress of these issues and also touched on the upgrade to the water treatment plant, waste strategy and road conditions.

The meeting was advised that:-

Council is well aware of the poor road conditions throughout the area, particularly the road between Delegate and Bombala.

\$800,000 has been spent on this road to date but the very wet weather conditions are making it extremely difficult to keep the road network in good condition.

Council is also aware that the log truck traffic is adding to poor road conditions. It was suggested that the community lobby the State Government to enact a clause within the Plantation and Reafforestation Act that enabled a levy to be put in place to be collected for road maintenance on log truck routes.

Council has received Disaster Recovery Funding for a number of flood events over the past year.

Issues Raised at the Walk:

Bill Jeffreys Park:-

Toilet upgrade – grant funding will be required for this project to be carried out.

Cabins in Caravan Park and Dump Point – feasibility study is being done.

Cleaning of amenities – Council's Parks and Gardens Officer (Terry Perkins) will investigate this.

Sealing of Road within the Park – requires grant funding.

Federation Walk – Council is aware that this requires additional maintenance, however, the season is making it extremely difficult to keep up with all the maintenance and mowing required throughout the Council area.

Compliance Issues:-

The following will be looked into by Council's Compliance Officer:-

Block on Corner of Hensleigh and Hayden Street

Truck Depot in Craigie Street

Burnt out house on corner of Campbell and Stuart Streets

Risk assessment of mushroom structures in Memorial Park.

House in Stuart Street.

Harvest Building in main street.

Fence between Memorial Park and neighbour will be erected once it is dry enough.

The Infrastructure Team will look into the drainage of Memorial Park.

Repairs to parking areas in the main street in front of the pub maybe included in the resealing program which is carried out in December and March if it is not a reconstruction job.

Waste Strategy:-

Nothing will change until a survey has been conducted.

Survey will be sent to the DPA who will help to distribute to the community.

Upgrade to Water Supply

Council received the promised funds from the State Government for upgrades to both Bombala and Delegate Water Supplies only six months ago.

Contract has been awarded for design and construction.

Still working on design concepts with the State Government.

A public meeting will be held in the early design stage.

The Local Environmental Planning Policy (LEP) including the Rural Land Strategy and Settlement Strategy will be going to next Council meeting for approval to place on public exhibition and commence community consultation.

Financial Sustainability Review is also being conducted. There is a survey on the Your Say page which needs to be filled out by 6 November for this Review.

Saleyards in the area.

Cooma saleyards still operates with the most viable sales being the calf sales.

Bombala saleyards is now operated as a depot only.

Saleyards may be impacted by the introduction of EIDs for sheep.
