

# NATIONAL PORTRAIT GALLERY

Paris to Monaro Pleasures from the studio of Hilda Rix Nicholas.

On Thursday 30<sup>th</sup> May this exhibition at the National Portrait Gallery was officially opened. After introductions and acknowledgements of the Wright family, in particular Bronwyn Wright, granddaughter of the artist and custodian of the Hilda Rix Nicholas studio, Louise Doyle the director of the Portrait Gallery invited Robyn Archer AO to open the exhibition. Ms Archer emphasised the significance of this exhibition in this centenary year for the National Capital Canberra.

The accolades and thankyous completed, the large crowd, which included several people from the Bombala/Delegate district, was invited to view the exhibition. And what a feast for the senses it was! Roaming through the four distinct galleries the colourful personality of Hilda was presented through an eclectic collection of paintings, sketches, letters, whimsical costumes, puppets, artefacts from around the world and furniture from her beloved studio.

The portraits of her family and local people and the placing of these people in the achingly familiar landscape of the Monaro, juxtaposed with small personal items from her studio give the visitor to the exhibition a sense of being invited into Hilda's very special world. Her world reached from rural Victoria to Paris, to the horrors of World War I and back to the peace of the Monaro. Through her wonderful creativity we can share all of her experiences.

The curator of this exhibition, Sarah Engledow is to be congratulated on creating a fabulous multifaceted portrait of Hilda Rix Nicholas.

The familiarity of the landscapes and characters presented make this a must see exhibition for the local Bombala/Delegate people.

The exhibition will be at the National Portrait Gallery until August 2013.

# INAUGURAL MEETING SNOWY RIVER MARCH CENTENARY CELEBRATIONS

A well attended meeting at the RT/CT Centre discussed proposed celebrations to mark the centenary of the Men From Snowy River March in 2016.

- The meeting resolved that Delegate would hold a similar re-enactment to that which took place in the town in 2006, and that a date be claimed for January 2016. This will replicate what took place in the town on the morning of the historic march which commenced in Delegate in 1916.
- Enquiries to be made regarding the entirely separate proposed march re-enactments to take place in November 2015, on the centenary of the famous Cooee March. There were nine recruitment marches which took place throughout NSW on different dates in 1915/16. Plans were discussed in Sydney recently about the logistics for the re-enactment of all of these marches taking place at the same time, arriving in Sydney together for the 100 year celebrations.

How different is the landscape today, to when those 13 men left Delegate, stopping at towns and hamlets along the way, before arriving at Goulburn 142 strong. The road in those days would have followed the old railway tracks, and motorised vehicles would have been few in number.

We hope to have further information regarding this proposal before the next meeting on **18th June at the RTC Centre at 7 pm to which all interested people are invited to attend** 



# OSWALD BRIERLY EXHIBITION

An exhibition of paintings by Oswald Walters Brierly 1817-1894), will shortly be opening in the Bundian Way Gallery. Brierly was the son of an amateur painter who struck up a friendship with Ben Boyd in London, who invited him to join him in the voyage of his yacht, Wanderer, to Australia arriving in Sydney Harbour during July 1842. By mid December they were anchored in Twofold Bay, where

Brierly was to be manager of Boyd's pastoral and whaling business. Almost immediately on landing he displayed a rapport with the Aboriginal people. He formed a deep friendship with Budginbro, also called "Toby", who showed him the old pathways to the Monaro. Some of these ways were surveyed and later became roads. He painted a watercolour of Twofold Bay, the year before he left, and although he went on to fame and knighthood, his later paintings were never as personal as the scene he captured as a thirty year old at Bilgalera. After departing in 1848, he travelled extensively and became close to

the royal family, mostly painting ships. In 1874 he was made marine painter to Queen Victoria and to the Royal Yacht Squadron.






#### FEED BACK FROM OUR POEM NIMBLE NEVILLE

# JONATHON GLONEK VIOLINIST

Delegate folk are indeed fortunate to be able to see a performance at the Delegate School of Arts by internationally known violinist Jonathon Glonek.

Jonathon commenced studies in South Australia at an early age with Latvian violinist Alita Larsens and Professor Ronald Woodcock, and first toured internationally at the age of 12. He has since developed as a gifted violinist and performing artist. He has presented many challenging and serious programs in solo performances throughout Europe and USA.

As a performer Jonathon Glonek enjoys an unusually broad and flexible repertoire. He is recognised for his intense personal style in presenting dramatic and impactful accounts of these works. In the course of his performances he has attracted strong critical acclaim for live performances across the range of this repertoire from J.S. Bach, classical sonatas, the romantic virtuoso medium and 20th century works.

He has also worked extensively organising and promoting serious classical repertoire to novice audiences in the belief that this can be accessed as a valuable experience by any person. In particular he has been strongly committed to bringing his performance to communities who would not normally have the opportunity.

# **Council Doings from Cr Bill Bateman**

The notes under were sent to staff about a fortnight ago as a result of queries or complaints from Delegate residents. As I will be away for some weeks if you see no action over the next month or so I wou

recommend you ring Council and ask when action might possibly be taken on your particular issue.

Trees lining the footpaths have branches hanging so low they are a danger to pedestrians. Could they be trimmed please?

Powers Road; As previously requested, could the road be attended to please?

Rocky Range Road is potholed and has been reported as needing "scrubbing" in a couple of sections. Gutters in Craigie Street are so rutted people are having trouble getting in and out of their driveways.

Residents in Hensleigh Street report that the dirt road surface is getting "very ordinary". It has been reported that Council is (or has been) quoting \$200 to remove car wrecks from the village With scrap metal prices quite high, companies will remove old vehicles and pay a modest sum to do so. Could this be looked at as a means of removing old car wrecks please?

Water pooling at the corner of Bombala St and Church St. Could a report on the progress to fix this be given. Water drainage about the kindergarten was investigated; it has been a known problem for some time. Could we have a progress report on what is being done to remedy this problem please?

I have had reports from residents at Wallendibby that they have lost tyres due to the poor condition of the road surface.

In general I might make the observation that it would appear that, apart from some major works keeping the unpaved surfaces of the Highway south of Delegate in repair, the local roads seem to be suffering a lack of attention, particularly in the township.

The Delegate water supply problem is being worked on by staff and further information will become available as and when Government departments get back to us with more details on what might be done.



Glonek on Saturday afternoon 8th June. Mr. Glonek spends most of his time in the Thailand, returning periodically to his property at





When Beryl read the account in both Bombala Times and Delegate Doings of the dedication of the aboriginal reserve at Delegate, the photo of the McLeod family brought back memories to Beryl of her grandfather Joe Bartley's bullock teams. Arthur McLeod, an aboriginal from the Reserve was employed as a driver of one of the teams. She said she recalls that years later Arthur's son visited the Bartley family at Delegate. Beryl wishes she had known about the McLeod family being here for the dedication, as she would have loved to have talked to them. It is unfortunate that the dedication was not advertised well and many people who would have liked to attend did not know until after the event.
