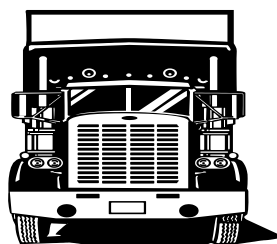

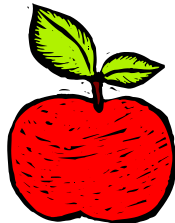

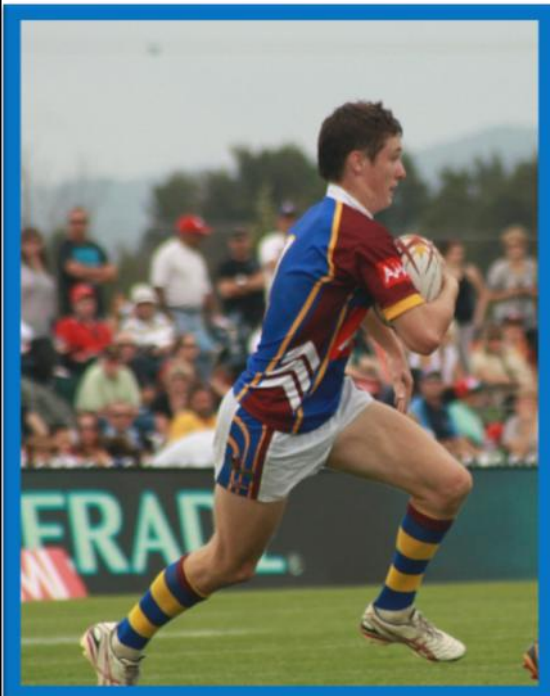

Dear Mr Guthrie

Thank you for the opportunity to discuss our proposal for the Delegate MPS with members of the Delegate Progress Association and then more broadly at the public meeting in February this year.

I am writing to confirm that in light of community feedback, the emergency service at the Delegate MPS will remain open. A range of additional supports for the emergency service will be put in place, including further support for the nursing staff to gain experience and attend educational programs, along with the investigation of opportunities for Telehealth.

Southern NSW Local Health District (SNSWLHD) will also continue to progress the other initiatives that were put forward at the meetings, ie:

- developing protocols to allow registered nurses to manage a wider range of conditions without the presence of a doctor;
- expanding the Wellness Clinic hours;
- working towards appointment of a nurse practitioner (including investigating whether the interest from local Special Purpose and Trust accounts can be used to support a training scholarship);
- formally combining management of the Bombala MPS and Delegate MPS (noting the community's request for separate Advisory Committees to remain).

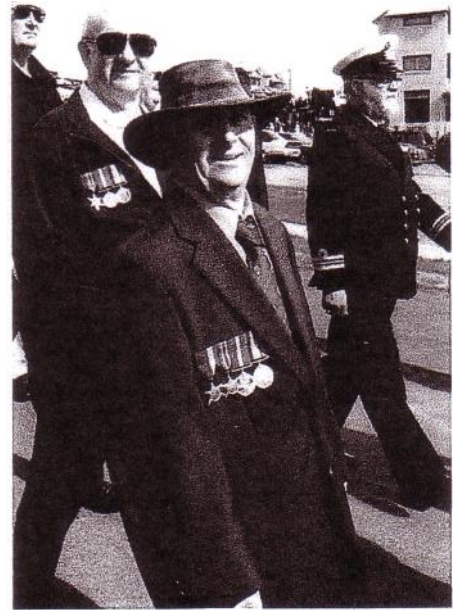
HELLO MY FRIENDS

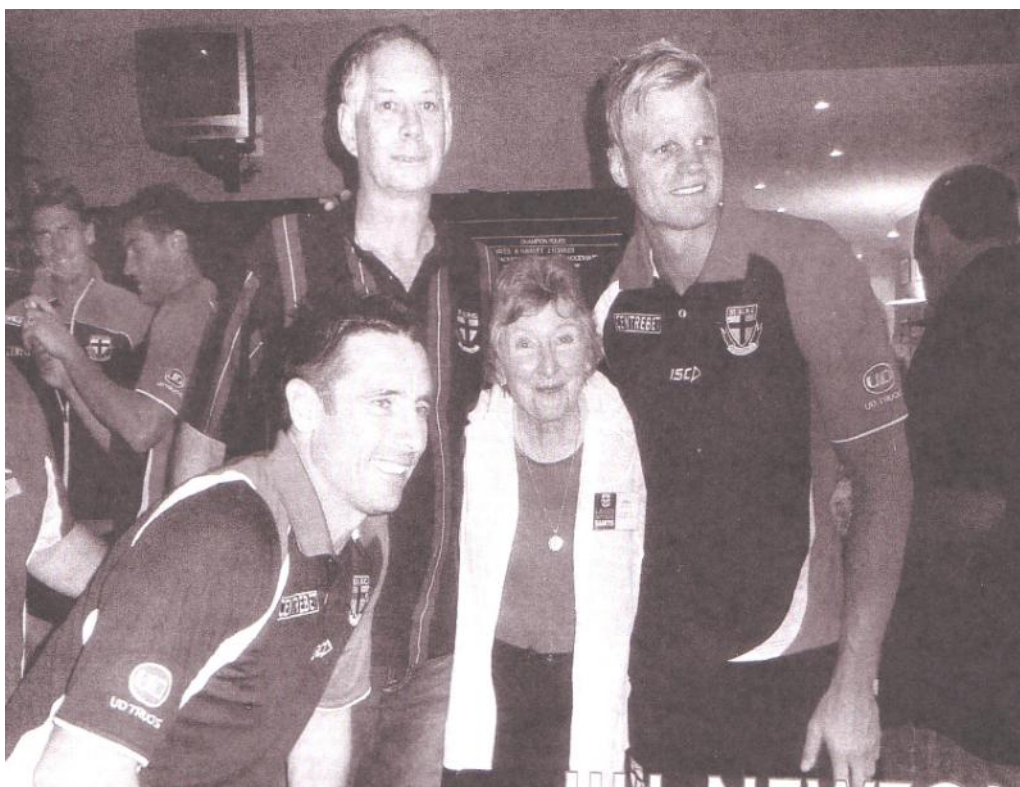

Point Venus, Tahiti

The passage of Venus in front of the sun, has been a popular topic lately, unfortunately here in the South East it was overcast and showery throughout the day, so we missed the actual sighting. Captain James Cook sailed all the way from England to Tahiti to watch this phenomenon in 1769. What a feat in those days with such a small ship, basic instruments and primitive conditions. A lighthouse was erected in 1869, in memory of the achievement, where he made observations and the place is called Point Venus, on the beautiful island of Tahiti, which Gloria Cotterill had the pleasure of seeing on her last holiday.
