PUBLIC SCHOOL TO CELEBRATE 150 YEARS ANNIVERSARY

The Delegate Public school will be celebrating an important anniversary on the week-end of the 30th October. They will be combining with the Progress Association's Heritage week-end and have many activities planned for the afternoon and evening of Saturday 30th. October.

Early records show that public education commenced in Delegate in a small hut with a few pupils, later moving to the present site where lessons were held in the historic brick building which still stands. There was also a headmasters residence on the site, and this area is now used as a sporting field. The numbers of pupils grew as more people settled in the town, and new modern buildings were added to the site. The end of the 20th Century saw numbers dwindle due to Delegate's declining population and the present number of pupils is 33. Former pupils are to be invited back and a programme of activities appears elsewhere in this edition of the Doings. Below: L: Kindergarten in 1974. R: The School circa 1930's. DELEGATE HISTORY COMMITTEE

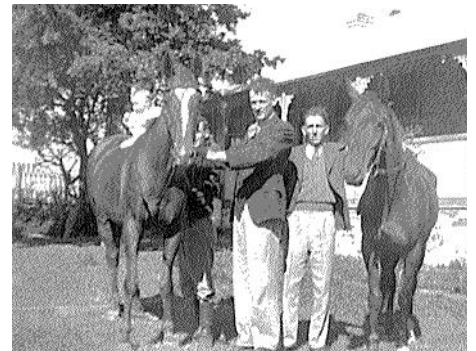
The History Committee are making good progress in their endeavours to gather as much local history as they are able to and transcribe it into one document. Several families have come forward with information and photos, and many more have promised to look into their family history. We are of course including the border areas, because when the first settlers arrived there was no border, between NSW and Victoria, the border not being defined, until surveyors Black and Allen surveyed the border in 1870 to 1872. We were very pleased to welcome Hazel Rodwell into our group, and to see the family photos which she brought along for us to scan. Hazel will be able to provide information on both the Cameron and Stewart families, who were early settlers in the area. Phillip Reed brought along some interesting photos, some of which are printed below. We are gathering together a good number of photos and would welcome any family photos of past generations, which we can scan while you are here. What has struck us most is the connection between many families, who are probably no longer aware of the links. When settlers first came, invariably relatives travelled together and settled in the area most had big families and married someone within the local district.

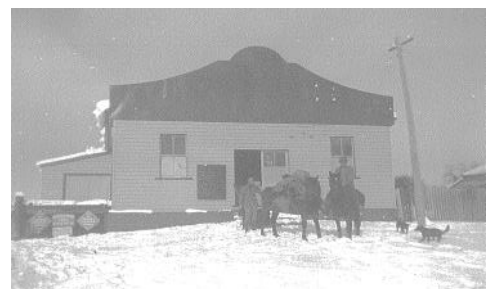

THE HISTORY OF PUBLIC EDUCATION IN DELEGATE

Following a petition to the Council of Education in 1870, requesting some form of educational facilities at Craigie, Corrowong and Delegate the nearest public school being Bombala, the District Inspector informed the residents that half time schools would be established at Delegate and Craigie. It was proposed that this would commence when suitable buildings were established and furnished. In half time schools the teacher usually taught at one in the morning and the other school in the afternoon, and would set home lessons for the children. Mr. William Noble an ex-student of Scotch College, Melbourne was living at Craigie and for most of 1871 ran an Adventure school (a private school). He was appointed on 22nd. August 1871 and took up duties shortly after.

At the time the Delegate school was housed in a wooden building, with a room for the teacher attached. Mr. Noble lived at Craigie and rode to Delegate to perform his duties, for which he received 10 pounds a year allowance to buy fodder for his horse.

In August 1873 the residents of Powers Corner (a village on Delegate river, a few miles north of Delegate) requested that Mr. Noble divide his time between their children and those at Delegate, rather than at Craigie, which was rapidly becoming a ghost town, the gold having petered out. This changeover was agreed and the residents of Powers Corner then built a school with accommodation for twenty five, an optimistic view, and one that proved not be warranted.

Later in 1873 the residents of Delegate applied for a grant of land on which to build a school and the Government agreed and purchased two acres with a river frontage. At the time of this request the school at Delegate was being held in a private house, perhaps because the original school was too small or had fallen into disrepair.

In 1978 there were 34 pupils on the rolls and Miss Eliza Campbell, whose brother was a member of parliament was the teacher at the school in Mr McHechnie's home, but several others offered their homes for use temporarily. These offers were made because *"the position of the house is objectionable as it is situated alongside a Public House and the children are likely to be morally contaminated by the demoralizing influence of inebriates and the influence of bad language."*

In 1880 tenders were called for the building of a public school in delegate, to accommodate 55 children, as the town was growing. The school was built of weatherboard and the residence had two rooms and a kitchen.

In 1907 a new school was built and the old one was used entirely as a residence. During World War 1, the teacher was Mr. Redmond who was the Secretary of the Men from Snowy River march committee, and this necessitated him being absent for a periods of time. While he was absent, his classes were taken over by a female teacher Miss Minnie Craig, the first of a number of assistants.

Attendance at the school increased from the 1950's, but has gradually decreased in the latter part of last century. The historic original stone building is now surrounded by a number of modern buildings, there is a Stephanie Alexander garden and kitchen, playground areas and tennis courts.

Those connected with the school, both past and present can be proud of the 150 years of service to the community,
