## AGED CARE IN OUR COMMUNITY.

A group of health professionals have recently held a series of meetings in Delegate to talk to the community about measures to enable people to live longer in their homes. The first meeting at the local MPS saw a good attendance of CCC committee members and Delegate Progress Association representatives. A local committee has also been formed to liaise between the community and the health representatives, Robin Guthrie representing Delegate, Margaret Weir representing Bendoc and Gough representing Bombala. Two more meetings took place in the Delegate School of Arts one on Wednesday at 1pm and one on Friday at 9am

Two of the items which the meeting recognised as priorities were social interaction and transport. Communication was also deemed to be important, but it was pointed out that when communicating, particularly with the elderly, it cannot be assumed that they can be contacted online as many do not have computers. The importance of housing and safety in the home was also discussed, as was the difficulty in finding providers to manage Aged Care Packages. There is nothing in the way of social activities provided by Council, available for Delegate, and only once a fortnight for Bombala residents.

## DELEGATE MULTI PURPOSE SERVICE HAS VIRTUAL HUB ACCESS

Southern NSW Local Health District have announced the opening of a virtual hub at the Delegate MPS, which will give the local community supported access to online appointments with Specialists and other health care professionals.

They state, that the new virtual hub further improves online experience by providing stable internet, high quality cameras and on-site staff who can help with equipment and take vital signs in-person.

Note:

This has been in the pipeline for some time, but we do not have any details as to whether appointments need to be made or what opening times will be. The DPA will request an update to the information which appears each month in the Delegate Doings

As specialist visits require transport to either Canberra or in some instances the south coast, this will be a welcome initiative, particularly for the elderly. This area has been lacking many health services for a number of years and we welcome any proposals which will improve better health outcomes for the people who live in Delegate and surrounds, including over the border.

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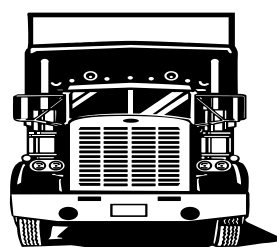

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# Peonies

There are some lovely peonies in gardens in Delegation. The small shrubs bear luscious flowers for 4-6 weeks in early Summer with the bonus that their big deciduous leaves develop good Autumn colour. They suit our climate because hard frost during winter dormancy is their number one requirement. Most commonly grown are the herbaceous types, i.e. those that disappear underground during winter, whereas the less common type, Tree Peony, retains a little woody framework above ground. The garden varieties currently available have been highly hybridised over many centuries and differ markedly from their wild ancestors. However, it is useful to look back to the source species and the breeding history to gain an understanding both of the cultivation needs and the skill of breeders.

**Origins.** The 30-40 known species fall into 3 geographic areas – herbaceous ones come from Southern Europe, tree Peonies from China/Nepal and 2 drab outliers in California/Mexico. All the wild types are deciduous having single poppy like flowers with conspicuous fleshy stamens. The photos below illustrate the range of flower colours and divided leaf forms the plantsmen initially had available to work with.



The **fleshy stamens** were an important feature because they gave the opportunity to develop extra petals in the flower to obtain the very full flowers that we have today.

**Left** is an intermediate type - the stamens are now developing a petal like shape but with pollen still being formed on the edges. **Below** the next step, stamens have developed a fully double bloom.

**History** Cultivars of the tree peony were grown in Chinese gardens from the sixth century for food and beauty but did not arrive in Britain until 1765, however, In Europe the native herbaceous types were in German gardens by 1600, and travelled to America in 1806.

**Cultivation.** Knowledge of the soils in their natural range indicates the need for lime which should be applied liberally each Autumn for flower bud development. The continental climate indicates the preference for dry summers which explains why mulching is not successful. Mulch by retaining moisture leads to the crowns rotting, also it prevents proper winter chilling and most importantly the crown must always remain close to the surface for flower bud development. The most common reason for failure to flower is planting too deeply. Some varieties benefit from ring supports as the flowers are so large that stems are weighted down. Plants are long lived – over 100yrs. but will become sickly if over-fertilised. Peonies have two types of roots – fleshy for food storage and fine ones to source water and nutrients. Division of clumps of **herbaceous** peony is easily done, pieces with several eyes, in my experience, produce flowering plants the same season. **Tree peonies** are more difficult to propagate and slow to respond to division so are sometimes grafted which explains why they are relatively expensive. Recently a new class, the '**Itôh**' hybrids have become available. They have more flowers per plant and an extended colour range suiting the cut flower trade. For garden display the herbaceous types are still the most successful.
