

#### Michelle Farran

Michelle lived a very full life, though one tragically cut short.

She was born in Sydney and lived in Canley Vale and the Taree area before going to University at Bathurst and Canberra. Her first job was as a Forest Officer in Bendoc in 1989 and she has been leaving her mark in the area ever since. In that time she has had two husbands, eight children and pursued a wide variety of interests.

Michelle had a razor-sharp intelligence – higher than 99.75% of the population. She was capable of immense empathy and sought out and supported the underdog, the misfit and the different. If she could see a problem that interested her she would get right to the heart of it and needed to fix it right now and nothing would distract her from it. She could talk the hind leg off a donkey that was underwater and encased in concrete.

She loved being in the bush – it refreshed her soul and inspired her creative mind. Traditional crafts were a challenge to her love of learning and she was never happier than when tanning a hide or plaiting rope. She was an active scout who in the week before she became ill, kayaked down the Murray for five days. Her musical

talents were often on show and culminated in her album 'Rockton' from which songs for her celebration have been taken. If there was a stage and singing going on, Michelle wanted to be there... all night.

Michelle was a fantastic educator. She had an affinity for what the purpose of a lesson was and would draw elaborate pictures to inspire her class to understanding a concept. She devoured knowledge about how the brain works and how children develop and used this to work out programs for students with special needs.

Despite being pregnant or breast-feeding for nearly twenty years she was not one to play with her children – preferring to teach them how to cook or sew or gut a fish. She didn't really have an ego so she was excellent at embarrassing her kids, such as being the only adult in her daughters' dance class aged 45.

Michelle loved this area and gave out to her community in so many ways – as deputy controller of the Bendoc SES, as a Regional Commissioner for Scouts, on numerous boards and committees, with the Rotary Community Choir and 23 years as a parent at Monaro Dance Centre.

On the 3<sup>rd</sup> February 2018 Michelle had a seizure and was diagnosed with Stage 4 Brain Cancer. Over the past year she had to cope with slowly losing her abilities. She kept her spirits; when she found she could no longer read she simply listened to audiobooks. The hardest thing was not being to 'talk in English' anymore. She fought hard despite the increasing discomfort and passed away on Sunday 17<sup>th</sup> February shortly after midnight surrounded by family.

She will be sadly missed by all those whose hearts she touched.








#### **DELEGATE PONY CLUB RALLY**

A successful Pony Club rally was held on Sunday 10th February, with riders and instructors being kept busy with a lot of different activities. The 8 riders started their day, with a nice warm up with their mounts, and then went on to some general ground work. This included learning new techniques to control their mounts. The riders then went on to some mounted game practises with riders learning to rein their mounts for command. The afternoon was a session of jumping, positioning ready for preparation for the up and coming local shows. The riders finished their day with some work in cross country jumping and techniques and were put through a small course. The next rally is March 3rd commencing at 9.30 for gear check with a 10am start.



#### SOME HINTS FOR SAVING ELECTRICITY.

Alan Hale has kindly put together some timely cost savings for electricity users as follows.

I just received by power bill and was shocked, pretty normal reaction, you might say! However it was because it was so low, \$194.80 less my concession 70.01, less my discount for payment on time \$23.38 a total of \$92.41, All our power bills end up around between \$100 and \$120.00. What I wanted to share with you was how we are able to get to this figure in a climate of power rip offs and bills which shock the pants off us. After talking with some of my friends, an average bill seems to be anywhere between \$400 and \$800. One person (a farmer) told be their bill regularly was around \$1000. We don't live like monks, but have learned, over the years that even a small saving regularly applied adds up.

Here's what we do. Boiling the jug can cost up to 25c per boil, so we only boil 2 cups of water at a time and just before the jug goes to boiling (bubbling) we turn it off. The element is still red hot and will continue to heat to boil in the next 10-20 seconds. Ridiculous detail you say? Well I drink 5 cups of coffer a day, plus we boil the jug to wash up twice a day, which is 7 boils per day which adds up to 210 boils per month, 840 boils for billing period @25c per boil is \$210.00. Any excess water boiled water is put into a thermos on the bench next to the jug and used for the next cup of coffee or tea. All the washing up is done in a small container in the sink, so we never need more than a jug's worth to wash up. We have a gas stove, but this is equally applied to an electric one. We never use the oven unless we have two or three items to bake. We do not use recipes that require cooking for more than half an hour. You would be amazed at how many there are that do not require long oven times. I also make no bake cheese cakes and slices. Our hot water system is only connected to the shower and we shower twice per week, never longer than 5 minutes. We only ever have one night light on at a time and turn off lights if we go to another room. We do not leave anything on stand by, everything is turned off at the switch, including phone chargers. We traded in our old refrigerator for a brand new 4 star rated 2 door one, much larger, but the temperature setting can be changed on the door, so at winter we can turn it down. We freeze water bottles and use in the fridge to help cool it down. We do not have a separate, freezer, use a solar light for night toilet. I hope this information will be of help to somebody. Our supplier is an Australian Company, which we cannot name and local and we have no reason to ever question our bill.





The close of the day saw many enjoy a BBQ tea and the music provided by MixFix. An added attraction was the "dunking" of the local policeman. Tye very generously agreed to being dunked, not once, but three times with the funds raised being put towards entertainment for next year's show. The night culminated in a very impressive display of fireworks which both young and the young at heart all thoroughly enjoyed.
