Melissa told us of her journey as a beekeeper, the many varieties of bees, from European to the native variety, their food requirements and samples of the type of hives required were on show on the stage. Teresa spoke of the advantages of growing native plants and she had brought baskets of native and other varieties of flowers, shrubs and trees, all of which she said provide food for bees. Many took advantage of her invitation to take samples and cuttings and all were given a small package of sunflower seeds so

we can expect a bold showing of these golden flowers in local gardens next summer. Both the weaving and beeswax wraps demonstrations were very popular and all went away with a sample of their work.

#### Council aligns customer service hours at all locations

Snowy Monaro Regional Council advises the Snowy Monaro community that from Monday 1 March 2021 all four customer services offices will operate Monday to Friday from 8.30am to 4.30pm\*.

Council operates four customer service offices at Bombala, Berridale, Cooma and Jindabyne.

As a legacy of the 2016 amalgamation the Cooma office was operating on slightly different hours to the other three which caused some confusion in the community.

Since the amalgamation much work has been completed to unify our customer services, and aligning the hours of operation across all locations marks the final step in ensuring that our community receives the same experience and standard of service regardless of which office they visit or call.

#### **DELEGATE PRE SCHOOL NEWS**

Delegate and District preschool has made a smooth transition into the school year with all children enjoying the changes to the backyard that were completed during the school holidays. As a result of receiving a Stronger Country Community grant, the upgrade to the back yard, which will be undertaken in stages during school holiday periods, was able to be started. A large verandah area was added to replace the aged pergola, a small cubby house and shop was formed using one end of our existing store shed and a stepped deck was created around the shady sandpit area. Stage two of the upgrade will see an extension to our bike track area and some various garden plantings.

Children and staff have also started to participate in some local town excursions. If you are around the town on a Monday, keep your eye out for the little fluorescent vests being worn by the children and stop and have a chat with us all. Our first walk was very exciting for everyone as we talked about the buildings we walked past, counted magpies and cockatoos and chatted to the many friendly faces in the street. Staff are hoping to make this a regular event for the children as part of our program and helping our service to feel like we belong to the larger community.

Delegate and District Preschool is currently open Monday – Wednesday from 8:30 to 4pm and still have vacancies for new enrolments. We are a funded preschool, so therefore our weeks of operation are the same as public schools, with four terms making up our year. We are able to offer care to children as young as 6 weeks old as part of our service approval with this still being offered on a term basis. # DELEGATE WATER SUPPLY OPTIONS STUDY

The Delegate community is invited by the Snowy Monaro Regional Council to attend a meeting at the Delegate School of Arts on the **9th March at 5.30pm** to discuss the water supply options study for the Delegate Water Treatment Plant upgrade

State Representative, John Barilarlo gave an assurance e to the Delegate Progress Association that he had given \$15000 to the Council to upgrade both Delegate and Bombala water supplies. Since then Council has unsuccessfully explored the option of a bore, which was found to be unviable.

This option would have been very unpopular with residents, who have heard of the problems caused by bore water at Nimmitabel. We do nor know what other options there are other than an upgrade to the existing supply, but we do know that we would like to see the "Not Potable" signs removed.

#### A new resource to keep you and your family safe

Snowy Monaro Regional Council today announced the release of the online disaster dashboard as part of a pilot program rolling out across 27 councils across NSW.

On the Snowy Monaro Disaster Dashboard residents will find real-time information on all emergencies in the local government area, information on preparing for emergencies and any assistance available to help individuals recover from disaster. The site pulls information from sources such as the RFS, LiveTraffic, Essential Energy and NSW DPIE.

The dashboard shows COVID-19 cases, fire incidents, flood incidents, road conditions weather radar, power outages, emergency news, and has links to ABC Radio and Council.

The service gives residents access to all relevant government information in one place, in real time. Data is collated by the Resilience NSW Regional Disaster Preparedness Program and displayed in an easy-to-understand format over a map of the area.

The Resilience NSW Regional Disaster Preparedness Program assists local governments in building on their capability to prepare for and respond to local emergencies.

The 2019/20 bushfire season in the Snowy Monaro demonstrated how unpredictable and fast-changing emergencies can be," said Mayor Peter Beer, Snowy Monaro Regional Council.

"Having immediate access to local emergency updates, as well as advice on preparations and potential risks will be of great benefit to our community. The new dashboard demonstrates Council is committed to providing residents with every possible resource in times of need."

Residents are encouraged to visit <a href="https://snowymonaro.disasterdashboards.com">https://snowymonaro.disasterdashboards.com</a> and bookmark the page. All browsers are supported, but full functionality is only available on up-to-date versions of Chrome, Firefox and Safari.

Attendance numbers at both services will be limited to the number of people that each area can accommodate with the 2 metre spacing rule. Seat will be allocated on a 1<sup>st</sup> come, 1<sup>st</sup> served basis.


# LOOKING BACK

#### Scent in the Winter Garden and Some Myths Dispelled.

Although they will not bloom until Spring and are not strictly a winter scent, let us get the Sweet Pea story sorted first up, since fast approaching March 17 is the oft touted best time in garden lore to sow Sweet Peas. Remember all pea **flowers** are suppressed by frost. If any pea is sown now as we enter the frosty period, we must maintain foliage for months during the cold times. Foliage becomes overgrown and subject to a number of fungal diseases. March 17 sowing properly belongs to climates warmer than ours such as Melbourne. Dr Keith Hammett of Massey, NZ is a world-renowned breeder (the hamettiii range) offers this advice to gardeners,

"Do not soak the seed before sowing," "Seeds need air as well as moisture to germinate. The exception to this is agriculturally grown seed from California that has not been mechanically harvested. They have experienced a 'Hard Seed' problem as a consequence. "Luckily here most mail order companies and major nurseries buy the far superior seed that has been hand harvested from plants grown in New Zealand. You'll also often be advised to

start your sweet peas off in autumn so they can establish before winter sets in, he says "the perfect time to sow, as days are starting to lengthen," he says. "Sweet peas, like culinary peas, germinate and grow at low temperatures." Sown in July plants will have experienced several hard frosts and be robust for Spring. So the myths about timing and hard seed arise from different climates and the commercial harvesting methods.



Sweet peas became garden flowers in 1690s, when a Sicilian monk, Francisco Cupani began sending colourful forms to gardening friends in Holland and England. His favorite, Cupani's Original, is still grown today, with profuse, powerfully scented pink-and-burgundy flowers. on bushy plants 5-6 feet high. By the mid 1700s, more colour variations arose, including Painted Lady, an intensely scented rose-and-pink bicolour that's also still available. The first dwarf sweet pea, Cupid, 1901, is also still in cultivation.

Interestingly the length of flower stem is maximised by the difference in day/night temperature and this is why stems get shorter as summer progresses. Sadly, sweet peas and many other flowers don't smell as strongly as they once did, especially when grown in urban areas. Research shows that polluted air can reduce plant fragrances significantly. Ground-level ozone in particular biologically disrupts fragrance production and breaks down scent molecules quickly, so they don't travel as far on the air. So it is not faulty childhood memories or ageing noses to blame at all!



Now to true winter scents, and most have relatively small flowers. Sweet box (Sarcococca confusa) prefers a good, well-drained soil. In time it will slowly sucker about and reach up to waist height. Try not to grow it in too much sunshine as the foliage tends to yellow – a shady back door where the fragrance can waft through an open window would be an ideal place to site it.

Witch hazels (Hamamelis mollis) are not the easiest of shrubs to grow. They are slow and prefer cool winters, hate windy, dry summers and poor soils. Like all winter flowers they benefit from being set against a dark backdrop where they are lit by winter sunshine. Hamamelis have an elegant tiered character rather like a Japanese maple and demand plenty of

space to stand out. Others to try are Mahonia, Daphne, winter-flowering honeysuckle (*Lonicera fragrantissima*) and wintersweet (*Chimonanthus praecox*), Skimmias also make berries. However, we need to rethink these European plants as water becomes more scarce and Summers hot-

ter.

There are many perfumed Australian plants that suit our climate. Eucalyptus elata has the strongest peppermint smelling leaves and is available in the dwarf form "Dry White". Flowers are Eriostemon and Victorian mint bush as well as many of the wattles.
