#### MORE BAD NEWS FOR THE DISTRICT'S AGED CARE RESIDENTS

Shock waves went to the Community when the news broke of the decision by southern Cross Care NSW to close Currawarna Hostel in Bombala. Following on from the news late last year that because of staffing problems, Delegate Aged Care residents could possibly be moved to Bombala MPS, there is much anxiety amongst the elderly population and their families. Petitions are already circulating for retaining Currawarna and we understand there will be a public meeting called which is bound to be very well attended, because Bombala and district have always valued Currawarna as a safe haven for the elderly, when they are no longer able to cope at home.

The Chief Executive of Southern Cross Care says that the hostel will not close until places are found for all the residents. Because the Bombala and Delegate MPS do not have the capacity to take the numbers involved, it means that residents would have to be moved out of the district, away from families and friends. This is a bad solution as it is a well known fact that a move like this seriously affects the resident's health and often shortens thir lives.

It is to be hoped that a solution can be found and there are other options which can be pursued. When Currawarna opened it was run locally by a local board, and this would again be possible as Commonwealth funding covers the cost of running Aged Care Establishments. Locally run aged care hostels are operating successfully throughout many rural towns in Australia, with the majority of their staff being local.

## RURAL DOCTOR CALLS FOR RADICAL NEW PLAN TO ADDRESS RURAL HEALTH WORKFORCE CRISIS.

In view of the current crisis in health care staff and doctors in this district, the following article is relevant to what is happening in our area today. It is important to note that Dr Mara, the author of the article has had a successful practice in Gundagai for over 20 years, where he has always encouraged participation of trainee doctors, resulting in a thriving practice with six or so doctors available at any given time. Also some of the graduates have come back to Gundagai and surrounding areas to set up practices of their own.

"Long term rural doctor and rural medical workforce advocate, Dr Paul Mara is calling on Governments and policy makers to act now to prevent a total collapse in rural and remote health systems across Australia. In an article in the Gundagai Independent he writes:

"Billions of dollars have been spent on the rural workforce industry, organisations and policies in the past, on education and training programs and so called workforce support measures and incentives, with very limited results and no accountability to outcomes. We are stuck in groundhog day with organisations continually coming back for more money using the plight of rural communities to justify their own political or organizational ends".

Dr Mara makes several proposals including: Mandating a compulsory third year of training and service in a rural or remote area for all graduates, regardless of intended career specialty prior to entry into vocational training program of choice. This would include a minimum of six months and up to twelve months rural or remote community placement dependent on location under the current Modified Monash model. The initiative would have an immediate impact with around, 3600 doctors each year spending time gaining valuable training and experience in a community-based practice and providing workforce support and relief for hundreds of rural communities."

Dr Mara said these initiatives would have considerable immediate leverage in addressing the current crisis and provide much needed support for rural and remote practices, while looking at longer term needs and structural change in the system.

Meanwhile the Delegate Progress association has received a letter from our Federal Member, Kristy McBain written by Minister David Gillespie, Federal Minister for Rural Health, advising of new modules being trialed in certain districts aimed to improve health care in rural areas, so we can only hope that this heralds the start of more innovative ways of dealing with what is now a major problem.

## NIMMITABEL CAMP DRAFT RAISES OVER \$40,000 FOR JACK VENTRY.

Jack Ventry, son of Damien and Mary has recently been diagnosed with leukaemia, which will necessitate him moving to Canberra for treatment over a period of six months. In a generous gesture of support the Nimmitabel Campdraft Committee and community has raised over \$40,000 to support the Ventry family. The Ventrys have always been keen competitors and supporters of local campdrafts, with Jack taking part from a young age. His grandfather Tom Ventry and late wife Pat ran the very popular Cabanandra Campdraft on their property at Deddick for many years. Now retired and living in Cann River, Tom still takes a keen interest in campdraft events. Jack's father Damien has recently been helping muster the cattle for the Delegate campdraft to take place on the 18/20th March.

In the bush when trouble strikes, communities rally to help because when serious illness happens the expenses pile up because it is necessary to go long distances for treatment, We wish Jack all the best for a return to good health.

#### GOOD NEWS ON THE DOCTOR FRONT

We are very pleased to hear that Dr Keith Gleeson, who has been helping out at the Bombala Surgery, plans to stay in the area and is considering coming to Delegate for one day a week. This will be great news for many, including our Victorian Border population. Dr Gleeson was surprised at the number of patients from over the border, a fact which we have been trying to relay to the powers that be in the NSW health system for many years.

Since Dr Colin Pate retired because of ill health, the Doctor situation has been a source of worry, with Agency Doctors often filling in for just a month a time. However Dr Gleeson, who was born in the area has been here for several months and has now decided to stay.

The Doctor's house in Hayden Street is owned by the Delegate Progress Association, who have just commenced converting one half of the building into a two bedroom flat. The other half is already rented but on a month by month contract. It is a large house so there is plenty of room for a surgery, but it will be six months or more before the work is completed.

Dr. Gleeson has been away for two weeks, but will be returning after that to take up duties at the Bombala Surgery and hopefully to do one day at Delegate.

#### CURRAWARNA AGED CARE TO CLOSE

Just when there is good news about a local GP, the community have been blindsided by Southern Health Care's decision to close Currawarna. With very little notice, residents are being asked to more to other centres away from families and friends. It seems that the word "Care" no longer applies to this organisation.

Naturally the communities of Bombala and surrounds are shocked and families traumatized by this sudden decision. The Community raised the funds to build Currawarna on land gifted to them and for many years the facility was run by a local board, with a Manager in place to take care of the day to day management. The facility was well run and welcomed by the elderly, not only in Bombala, but throughout the District. In later years Currawarna was taken over by Southern Cross Care a private organisations who have several other Aged Care residences. Their reason for closing is Staff shortage, but this has to be taken with a grain of salt because since Covid, this has been the case everywhere.

Apparently a Bombala Committee is looking for another Aged Care Provider to take over the facility. However it is worth mentioning if this does not eventuate, many such facilities are being run by local towns throughout Australia, with a Board who meet monthly in an overseeing capacity. 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#### DELEGATE MULTI PURPOSE SEVICE NEWS

It is welcome news to hear that the Nursing shortage crisis at the Delegate Multi Purpose service, has been averted with staff at present covered until the end of May. With the unwelcome news of Currawarna being closed by operators of Southern Cross Care, it is vital that beds remain open at Delegate and Bombala Multi Purpose Services. The present situation in Delegate is that there are Agency Nurses until the end of May and they are advertising for an Assistant In Nursing. Also we hear on the grape vine that Bombala Nurses are being given shifts in Delegate and we are at a loss as to why this wasn't considered before as domestic and clerical staff are employed to move between the two services. People have been too ready to circulate unfounded rumours, causing unnecessary stress to residents and their families. Two respite residents who are only admitted for a maximum of two weeks, were discharged on the 6th March, which led to the rumour that the facility was closing.

We can only imagine the stress that is being felt by the residents of Currawarna and their families, by the announcement by Southern Cross Care that the facility is closing and residents being moved to other homes away from the district, with what appears to be undue haste. It is a strange decision by Southern Cross Care, as demand for Aged Care beds is increasing, but with private operators these homes are just a business requiring a certain profit margin. Perhaps Southern Cross Care felt that with the building of the Kennedy Aged Care Centre, there would be less demand for beds with people opting to move into the small apartments provided.

It is an established fact that moving the elderly away from their towns, friends and families causes such angst that their health deteriorates. Aged Care should be provided in all rural towns, whether it be Government, community or private operators whose decisions unfortunately are based on profits. However without the need for a profit margin, Community run Aged Care facilities, with at least 20 beds can operate successfully with Federal Government funding.
