THE DELEGATE HOSPITAL CUP

The above cup was an important fixture in the District's Racing calendar and local trainers vied for the honour of winning the trophy at the Delegate Races. Race meetings were a big part of the social life of the district, with Cabanandra and Bendoc joining with Delegate to host the events. Great interest was shown in each race, with mostly locally bred and trained horses competing, although there were a few retired race horses in the mix. Large crowds always attended, with Delegate boasting a Grandstand, Judges Box and a Bookies ring.

The Delegate Hospital Cup trophy which was written about in the last Delegate Doings, is being currently held by a man in Darwin. During his research on the history of horse racing, he saw the cup advertised on line and subsequently purchased it. Doreen Standen tells us that there is also a similar cup in the local history room, and unfortunately like the one in Darwin there is no winners name engraved on it.

Philip Reed has kindly sent us an old photo of the finish of the Cup when it was won by the Pat Ivill who trained Brave Beau, ridden by Ross Taylor. No doubt there were other local winners for this annual race, whose names have been lost in the mists of time. We would be interested of any families who have history or photos of local horse racing. There was no royalty treatment for most of these horses, who were probably ridden and used on the farms. I can remember my brother and a friend riding from Delegate River across Cottonwood Range to enter two horses in the Bendoc Races.

DELEGATE RUGBY LEAGUE HISTORY

With the Bombala Rugby League team due to play their annual game at the Delegate Show and Sports ground on May 13th. Philip Reed has underrtaken the task of gathering some history of the game of League in Delegate. He has sent us a copy of a letter, from a John Helmich who is the son of a man who coached the Delegate team in 1933. This was probably the first time Rugby League had been played in Delegate, as previous to 1932 Union was the sport of choice.

The letter does not reproduce well for printing but below are some excerpts.

"While I can't recall a lot of what he experienced during his time in Delegate as I was only young at the time, but I can remember a now long lost photo of him standing on the field holding a block of ice. This certainly gave me an idea of the tough conditions that the players must have endured at that time.

In recent years I have tracked down a few stories of the Delegate team in 1933 from historical readings in both the Delegate Argus and the Bombala Times. That year Delegate lost out in the semi finals to Bombala in a hard fought game with the score 7-5. One particular item from later on that year, 15-10- 33, was a letter from my father showing his appreciation for the time he was captain coach. The article highlights special tanks to Mr. and Mrs. Cheriton."

THE THREE MAGIC "P's" Pansy, Polyanthus and Primula by S. Tocchini

These three showy winter flowering plants are just made for the Cool Climate Garden and, since each have a different microclimate preference, every part of the garden can boast colour. Pansies are probably most versatile preferring a sunny position and ae more forgiving of irregular waterng, where water is not constantly available polyanthus like a little shade and primula do well in dry shade.

Pansies are the breeding pinnacle of the violaceae family that includes violets and the wild plant *Viola tricolor* domesticated by the Greeks in the 4th century B.C. for medicinal use. Lady Mary Elizabeth Bennet (1785-1861) collected wild violas and produced hybrids in 1813 all still featuring the wild type 'whiskers'. Simultaneously James Gambier was crossing the wild types with broader petals to create the rounded shape

flower. In 1839 William Thompson used a single chance seedling with a block of colour to produce the first pansies that had blotches (faces) instead of whiskers. About the turn of the 20th century a Scottish grower, Dr. Charles Stewart bred the pansy with clear colours (no face). By the 1950's raspberry colours were introduced. The grouping of pansy and viola is somewhat artificial but violas are taken to mean those with smaller flowers and, since these are closer to mountain types, they are usually the more cold hardy. Some still have perfume, mostly blues and yellows, this also reflecting closer ties with the wild heritage.

Polyanthus are the breeding pinnacle of another European plant family, the primroses, native to the United Kingdom with infusion of other European primula to become *P. variabilis*, the polyanthus of today. One of the earliest named varieties is *Primula elatior* 'Gold Lace' from 1760 when the Curator of the Physic Garden, Chelsea, Philip Miller wrote 'there are all sorts of polyanthus which have been so much improved during the past fifty years that in some parts of England are so much esteemed as to sell for a guinea a root'. At that price, even today, division would be worthwhile. Division is recommended because congested clumps either lose vigour or rot away.

Polyanthus are mostly available in punnets as 'Pacific Giants' and can be kept for many years if divided.

Primula are another diverse group, not from Europe this time, but centred in the high, damp meadows of the Himalayas. *Primula malacoides* also has a very recent garden history only introduced as seed in 1908 by the plant explorer George Forrest who noted it as a field weed. The first primulas were grown in England, flowered so well in cultivation that the species was quickly adopted by commercial seed growers. Within a decade a selection of delicate appearance became named Fairy primulas. They are hardy to frost and low temperatures, may self-seed but do not like heat together with high humidity. The most important cultural requirement is excellent drainage, since the roots rot in soil that is wet or heavy. The other garden Primula species like *obconica* need a warmer climate than ours.
