

#### **Arts Advisory Network Meeting**

A meeting was held on October 6<sup>th</sup> at the Council Chambers to establish an Arts Advisory Network.

The aim of this meeting, attended by several people interested in the cultural development of our region, was to provide a framework upon which the Council can develop and facilitate the Arts in the Bombala/Delegate and border areas. There are already many opportunities for partnerships with groups ranging from pottery to painting, photography and papercraft, from sculpture to singing, from woodwork to woolcrafts, and of course dance and drama. A Network can oversee, communicate between and bring these groups together, and most importantly facilitate events which showcase their talents.

This informal group will meet a minimum of four times per year and see their role as

- Developing and maintaining a database of artists. The Borderline gallery already has a database which can be used as a basis for this.
- Improving communication by building an email list and encouraging people to forward on information about the cultural scene
- Establishing a calendar of events. Organisations can register events with the Bombala RTC and from there a calendar can be circulated. This would enable groups to plan their events and quickly establish that dates have not already been taken. This calendar would be published in local newspapers as well as on the council website. It will also be emailed once per month to registered groups.
- Supporting projects put forward by different groups. Currently there are three projects to be supported
  - 1. The 'Art in the Park' event in the Bill Jeffreys Park at Delegate planned for April 28th 2012 which will incorporate a Sculpture competition and varied Art exhibits and activities.
  - 2. The developing of an Art Space in Bombala in close co-operation with the Delegate Borderline Gallery
  - 3. The Bibbenluke Celebration of Crabapples in December 2011
- Investigating the Christmas Street carnival for 2011 with suggestions to give this event an art focus
  with activities including mural painting, pavement art, installation art, street theatre, wandering minstrels etc.
- Researching and promoting the plans for development of the Railway Park. This plan envisages the use
  of containers on flat bed rail trucks which can be converted and utilised for art and historical exhibits,
  studio workshops and performance spaces.

The future of the Arts in the Bombala region is very bright and the Arts Advisory Network is open

to any enthusiastic and energetic people who are committed to promoting and facilitating any artistic ventures. If you wish to have your name included on the database or the email register please contact Karen Cash at the Bombala Council



The first part of the meeting which opened at 6.30pm featured a presentation by the Delegate Progress Association President, Bill 'Chops' Guthrie. 

tion Christmas get together.









# LOOKING BACK



The above photo of the Mila Prison Camp was taken in 1939, about the time it was disbanded before the second World War.

The camp was built for low risk prisoners in 1928, and it was working parties of prisoners who planted the first pines in the district. The NSW Forestry at the same time started the plantations in the Rockton area. When the camp was closed the two man huts were sold locally by the NSW Forestry.

The old prison camp was on the site of the present Bondi Lodge which was built by the Forestry and is presently leased by Mr. Brian Humphries.

Apparently there was a change in policy when a new Governor was appointed to the camp, and some long term prisoners were sent there, causing local concern when one escaped. Fortunately the escapee was thwarted in his bid for freedom when he tried to cross the Snowy River, which was in flood at the time.

#### STAYING SAFE FROM SNAKES

Beware of snakes with the start of the warmer months, Southern NSW Local Health District warned today. Director of Critical Care Dr Trish Saccasan Whelan said snakes are starting to become active in the region as the temperature begins to rise. "Snakes normally stay well away from people but during the warmer months they are actively looking for food," Dr Saccasan Whelan said. Snakes can be encountered in gardens and around houses, especially those near bushland.

Dr Saccasan Whelan also cautioned against going outside in the dark without shining a torch on the ground and also reaching into long grass or hollow logs without looking into them first. Areas around the home should be kept tidy and lawns mowed to discourage snakes. Wearing closed shoes and long pants can provide some protection when walking in bushland. Most snake bites are the result of trying to catch or kill snakes. Snakes should be left alone and given plenty of space. Don't try to catch or kill a snake, Dr Saccasan Whelan said.

#### First Aid Treatment for Snakebites

In event of snakebite swift administration of first aid is crucial and has been medically proven to be life-saving. In most cases the vast majority of venomous snakebites occur on the victim's arm or leg.

Understanding the correct first aid is vital for treating a snake or spider bite and can some times make the difference between life and death.

First aid procedures for snake and spider bites include:

- · Place a firm bandage to the limb commencing at the bite site, then going down to the fingers or toes and then up to the limb to the hip or shoulder;
- · several bandages may be required or use whatever material is available such as clothing;
- · Keep the limb still;
- If the bite is to the leg splint the legs together. If the bite is to the arm, splint the arm to the trunk of the body;
- · Never interfere with the bite site by cutting, attempting to suck out the venom or trying to remove the venom from the skin.
- · Bring transport to the patient, never allow the patient to attempt to walk or run;
- Under no circumstances should the bandage be removed until the patient has reached hospital;
- · Call 000 once First Aid has been applied.

All local hospitals have a comprehensive list of local species and treatment protocols.

Hospital emergency departments have access to antivenom which enables the emergency treatment of bites from black, brown and tiger snakes.

Dr Saccasan Whelan encourages all people living in or near bushland to keep bandages on hand to render first aid in the case of a snakebite.

"Bandaging the snake bite immediately can be lifesaving and has been scientifically proven to retard venom flow to the central circulation," she said.
