CALL TO ACTION!

CURRAWARNA PUBLIC MEETINGS PLANNED

Southern Monaro locals are being urged to attend two important public meetings, aimed at updating the community on future plans for Currawarna and other aged care services in the Bombala region. Both meetings will offer interested locals a briefing on the significant work being done by the volunteer

Board of the newly formed Currawarna Assisted Living Limited (CALL) and its focus on re-opening Currawarna as a community based model for 'Assisted Living'.

The first meeting is planned for Friday October 21 at Club Bombala from 2pm and another meeting will be held at Delegate School of Arts from 6:30pm on Tuesday, October 25. These dates and times have been confirmed in consultation with a wide range of community groups, to ensure as many older locals as possible can attend – while also offering an evening option at Delegate, for those community members unable to make it to a daytime meeting.

With the full support of the original Stand for Currawarna Committee, CALL hopes these meetings will also be a chance to update the community on the potential for improved aged care services across all levels of care. As such, the agenda will also include an update on discussions to increase the number of MPS beds available at Bombala hospital into the future, as well as an update on the Kennedy Trust project. The potential role that Aged Care packages and Care at Home services might play in future local aged care options will also be highlighted.

CALL Chair, Keith Campbell, says both meetings will outline the significant work currently being done to re-instate support for our aging community, after the unexpected closure of Currawarna in April this year.

After engaging in wide industry consultation and with strong support from all tiers of government, Keith says the feedback for CALL's community focused concept has been extremely encouraging.

“The community-based model of care we have developed for the Bombala region is even being heralded by some industry advocates as a potentially innovative and adaptable solution for aged care across regional Australia. Locally, we believe our model may also be applicable to aged care services in other areas of our Snowy Monaro Shire and across Eden Monaro. “In the case of Currawarna, Bombala is in the fortunate position of having an A-Grade facility already constructed, which will be returned to the community via the Currawarna Assisted Living Ltd structure. We also have a large number of the former staff members of Currawarna who have expressed a strong desire to return to employment within this much-loved local service.

Our community's commitment to Currawarna is clear. Which is why the core ethos for Currawarna moving forward is all about 'locals caring for locals'. Keith says the only significant barrier to re-opening Currawarna by Autumn 2023 is the accumulation of enough working capital, estimated to be in the order of one million dollars, to fund initial operating costs. While that sounds like a daunting number, the board of Currawarna Assisted Living is confident that, through community fundraising, support from across all tiers of government and benevolent contributions, CALL can realistically reach this target.

“To assist with the required fundraising, we will be calling on interested community members to join a volunteer fundraising sub-committee for Currawarna Assisted Living Ltd. We must always remember that in the 1970's, the original Currawarna model and building was created and partially funded by our small but mighty Monaro community. Because of that original community foresight and hard work, Currawarna has successfully serviced our region for over four decades. We can do it again...and we will!”

BUNDIAN GALLERY EXHIBITION OPENING.

As part of the School of Arts Festival week-end, the Bundian Way Gallery has an impressive new display by aboriginal artist Nuundur Guunj, which was officially opened on Saturday morning. Realistic black and white paintings of aboriginal elders, musicians, women, children and others drew lots of admiration. Visitors arrived at the gallery following a visit to the Settlers Hut for morning tea and damper and a recital of “old tales of Corrowong” by Bronwyn Wright.

John Blay and partner Christine came from Eden for the occasion and John did the “Welcome to Country” in the absence of BJ Cruze, who was unavoidably delayed. The exhibition was then officially opened by the patron for the Bundian Gallery, Councillor Bob Stewart. 



Then and Now, Much Change But Often the Same Outcomes

In 2019, after a series of hotter summers and drier winters, I wrote in Doings,

'Record dry conditions are currently being experienced Australia wide. Many areas that have traditionally supplied fruit and vegetables are unable to even plant a crop this year. This means that food at the supermarket is likely become very expensive.'

In 2022, after record rainfall for 2 years, I must write,

*'Record wet conditions are currently being experienced Australia wide. Many areas that have traditionally supplied fruit and vegetables are unable to even plant a crop this year **due to repeated flooding**. This means that food at the supermarket is likely become very expensive.'*

Our area has the distinction of having the greatest 'between years' variation in rainfall in Australia and we break records even globally. This is because our rain comes from multiple weather systems and that we just happen to be on the edge of each of them.

Normally, we rely principally on the 'Westerlies' wind system. It delivers steady **winter** rain but this belt is moving South and increasingly missing the continent completely. We get summer rain from the edges of the monsoon belt when it extends a little Southward and Indian Ocean Dipole (IOD) also contributes. Overriding all of these is the 'La Nina' effect that we are experiencing now.

The long-term projections for our area are a continuation and intensification of what is already happening: that winter–spring rain will continue to decline **a lot** and that summer-autumn rain will increase **a little**. This not good news because as temperatures rise so will warm season evaporation making soils that have not been replenished by winter rain very dry indeed.

Now this year we are overwhelmed by wet soil. Roots constantly search soil crevices (pores) for water. They do this by constantly protruding new microscopic hairs from the root tips. These do not survive exploring dry pores as they instantly wither up without moisture. Nor can they survive saturation because all living tissue requires oxygen to function and dies without it. The death of root hairs causes the plant to expend energy in producing new ones. At best this depresses growth and at worst allows entry of pathogens through the breakdown of dead tissue.



Then, when conditions were dry, applying mulch and encouraging ground cover plants, were the factors that kept soil moister and cooler helping plants to cope.

Now, we must remove mulch and ground foliage in order to expose as much bare soil as possible. This will maximise evaporation and allow entry of air into the soil. Air in the soil encourages root survival and the functioning of essential soil microbes. Also, it is important not to dig saturated soil as this destroys structure, that is, destroys the pores and causes further collapse of the aeration system.

The same outcomes despite the weather. This includes slugs and snails that are always with us but seem to be especially destructive in Spring when plants are making fast and tender growth. They have benefitted from the wet and persist in great numbers this year.

Also, Juvenile Harlequin bugs (*Dindymus versicolor*) are starting to appear.

Whilst wet conditions generally disadvantage insects the milder winter temperatures have enhanced survival of these sap suckers. They suck sap often just behind a flower bud causing the flower to fail to open. The numbers can build up in the garden to such a degree that it becomes difficult to grow some plants successfully, for example they can cause flower buds of roses to wither, demolish hollyhocks and cause the shoots of potatoes to collapse. In the morning sun the adults travel to the top of the tallest plants and cluster in a mating event. The slightest disturbance causes them to drop to the ground.



Using this information means that they can be easily trapped. Hold a container (a small saucepan is ideal) with a tablespoon of oil floating on an inch or two of water below them and tap the stem. The bugs just plunge to their death and every pair killed means 35,000 eggs less. They have favourite plants (like hollyhocks) so this means that it is useful to have a tall trap plant in each bed because they congregate on it making your job of finding them so easy. When a hatching occurs you often see a mass of orange red tiny bodies on a log, a warm stone or even in the metre box. A short burst of ordinary fly spray will kill thousands in seconds. (Don't be tempted to put flyspray on plants though as the spray will desiccate the foliage). As the bugs do not fly far the numbers in your garden can be gotten to a low level in a season or two.

Add into the mix, **Sawfly larvae (Cherry slug *Caliroa cerasi*)** weakens pear, cherry, plum and hawthorn trees by skeletonising the leaves. The traditional method of control has been to blow ash, lime or vacuum cleaner dust over the affected tree. This abrades the soft body causing the slug to shrivel through moisture loss. Since this is messy and hard to do spraying 2-3 times with the relatively safe pyrethrum has become the favoured control method especially on big trees although newly planted and vulnerable fruit trees can be manually cleaned by wiping the slug off the leaves with a tissue. This is not a favourite job as the slug is quite smelly.



So, conditions do change but some things in gardening stay the same.
