#### 100 YEARS YOUNG

Rhonda Parkin from Perth WA has sent us news of her uncle Reigh Lewis, a former Delegate man who has celebrated his 100th birthday in September. Reigh's two brothers Neville and Ron both deceased him. Below is Rhonda's story of Reigh's life.

There were big celebrations in Singleton on 10 September for Mr Reighmond Gordon Lewis who turned the mighty age of 100.

Ray was born in Delegate, delivered by a local midwife on 10th September 1921, first son of George and Irene (Lucas) Lewis who lived in Hensleigh St, Delegate. Ray had 2 younger brothers. Walter (Ron) 1923-2008 and Neville 1926-1993.

Ray's grandparents Walter and Mary Anne Lucas lived in a house overlooking the Delegate river and George's parents, Francis and Susannah Lewis lived in Majors Creek NSW.

Ray grew up in Delegate and attended the Public school. Before attending school each morning, Ray would walk a short distance to Mrs Bartley's farm and herd her cows to the paddock from the dairy after they had been milked. After school he would return them to the dairy to be milked again. Ray also helped the local butcher. His mother Irene was very happy when he was given a pigs head which she would press and make brawn which was very handy with three growing boys to feed. Ray would sometimes wag school to have a day of fishing, swimming in the river or shooting rabbits which would also end up on the dinner table. After leaving school at an early age he worked on farms around the district. He remembers his family having holidays at Bermagui and also panning for gold with his father George in the Delegate river.

Being a strapping young fellow, Ray loved his sport and learnt to play cricket and football at school.

After leaving school, Ray played cricket for Delegate No 2 and Delegate Green teams, being a fast opening bowler.

Ray found employment working for Jack Commons on the "Spring Flat" property as a general hand. He would possibly ride his bike the 17 miles to begin his work week of 5 1/2 days. His wage for the week was 12/6 (\$1.25) which he received once a month. Saturday's being his 1/2 day off, he would rush home and gather his gear and off to sport. Sunday afternoon he had to return to the Common's property for start work next morning. Ray changed jobs, jackarooing for Don McKay on his "Riverview" property 9 miles out of town. His wage now being 1 pound 10 shillings per week which included his board and food. His bed being out on the veranda of the house which would be mighty cold during the winter.

While camped out with Mr McKay and other workers, Ray was told to make scones for morning tea. He informed the boss that he had never made scones so he was given verbal list of ingredients and left him to it. Ray made the dough and cut them out and put them in the camp oven to cook. He returned to find a perfect batch of scones, so nice in fact he put them in a tin to prevent them being eaten by insects or animals. The men returned for

their morning smoko and Ray on opening the lid his smile dropped, finding his lovely batch of scones had melted. He learnt a lesson that day to never put freshly baked scones in a tin as they would sweat and melt. From that time on he would wrap them in a tea towel. This inspired him and he became a good cook, making a great damper and of course, scones.

Ray is a World War 2 veteran. He enlisted in the Australian army in July, 1941 at the age of 19 yrs 10 months when he travelled by steam train to the Army recruiting centre in Paddington, Sydney. After completing his basic training at Cowra, he was posted to 2/6th Armoured Regiment at Greta NSW. The unit then moved to Singleton, NSW in January 1942. Ray was trained to drive the armoured tank which would have been a challenge given his tall height. In September , 1942, Ray sailed from Brisbane with his unit of M3 Stuart light tanks on the liberty ship "Henry D Thoreau" and served a tour of duty in New Guinea. He returned home to Australia in April, 1943.

While on leave from the army, Ray met his future wife Melba (Meg) Gould who lived in Singleton. After returning home from the war, Ray settled in Singleton and married Melba on 3rd June 1944 at All Saints Church. They had 2 children, Kenneth Geoffrey born 6 February, 1946 and Noelene born 4 August, 1949. Sadly, Melba passed away March 2008.

In December 1945, Ray commenced work with the Patrick Plains Shire. He later left the shire and commenced work with the NSW Government Railways. He started as steam engine fireman, moving through the ranks to becoming driver. After steam was fazed out, he trained and became a diesel locomotive driver before retiring in 1981 as Driver in Charge of Singleton depot.

Ray excelled in the Singleton local cricket. Standing at 6 ft tall with an unusual three pace step, launched his fast paced deliveries. Known as "Trundler" and with figures like 6/1, 9/9, 5/8 and 7/22, there is little doubt he was a force to be reckoned with. He retired from cricket at the age of 46.

Over the years Ray and his family often returned to Delegate on holidays where he enjoyed helping Ron at shearing time at "The Forest" and Neville at Lewis's garage. Not forgetting having a few too many while out getting firewood with Ron and Neville.

Ray remains Patron of the Singleton RSL Sub-branch NSW and RSL Bowling club.

This year at the age of 99yrs and 10 months he received a pacemaker and is in good health and doing well for his age.

### **Kids Recipes**

#### **Chocolate Spiders**

#### Ingredients:

- 1 pkt Chang's Original Fried Noodles (100 grams)
- 2 thspns crunchy peanut butter 200 grams of chocolate (milk, dark or white)



#### Method:

- 1. In a microwave safe bowl, break up chocolate into small chunks.
- 2. Add peanut butter and melt on high for about 60 seconds.
- 3. Stir the chocolate mixture and if it is not melted, heat for repetitive short bursts (5 10 secs) until the chocolate mixture has completely melted.
- 4. Add the noodles and mix well.
- 5. On a tray lined with baking paper, spoon mixture into small mounds. Alternatively you can spoon the mixture directly into patty pans.
- 6. Pop them into the fridge to set and you are done!

This recipe makes approx 20 Chocolate Spiders and apparently they can last in the fridge in an air tight container for two weeks.

#### **Clinkers Rocky Road**

#### Ingredients

500 g milk chocolate or dark chocolate

30 g coconut oil optional

250 g Clinkers cut in half

100 g marshmallows

200 g raspberry lollies



#### Instructions

Line the base and sides of an 18 x 28cm rectangular slice tray with baking paper. Chop the Clinkers in half and set aside.

Place the chocolate and coconut oil into a heatproof, microwave-safe bowl.

Heat, uncovered, on 50% power, stirring every minute with a metal spoon, for 4-5 minutes or until the chocolate and coconut oil melts.

Remove from the microwave and stir until smooth.

Stir through the Clinkers, marshmallows and raspberry lollies.

Spread the mixture into the prepared baking tray and place in the fridge for 2 hours or until completely set.

Use a sharp knife to cut into slices (if you are having trouble cutting the slice, run your knife under hot water and then dry completely before cutting - the heat will help to cut the slice evenly).

#### HISTORIC BURNIMA HOMESTEAD SOLD

Matthew and Laura Benwell the new owners have been extremely busy renovating and restoring the gardens and surrounds of the old building. Built in 1916 by Frederick Young of Queanbeyan, who was also the builder of Yarralumla, residence of the Governor General.

The building is supposedly haunted by the ghost of a young maid-servant and a window at the rear of the building is where her face supposedly can be seen, but I must add that she did not appear when I was there.

As soon as Covid restrictions allow they will be opening for tours, something which will be welcomed by locals and visitors alike.



#### Plant Profile PERIWNKLES

The VINCA family ranges through <u>perennial</u> trailing vines that root readily from the nodes to well behaved annual shrubs that give wonderful summer colour.

THE PERENNIAL types come from Europe and are hardy in all climates. There are two perennial species *Vinca major* and *Vinca minor* and both originally had sky blue flowers. Over time these have been selected to have flowers from white through to purple shades as well as some with variegated leaves.

*Vinca major* has become an invasive weed worldwide that thrives in shaded or partly shaded spots particularly









*Vinca minor* on the other hand is a useful ground cover that grows only 10-15 cms high that can be mown to create a dense glossy stand. There is a lovely purple form that blooms from late winter through to earl winter the following year.







THE ANNUAL types are tropical in origin. They form small neat shrubs of glossy dark green leaves and in temperate areas they give great summer colour with the lush appearance of the tropics. They are usually purchased in seedling punnets as they are a bit slow to raise from seed. The flowers were originally in shades of white and pink with a dark eye. Re-

cent breeding efforts in USA have produced a wider range of colours and increased flower size. The recent breakthrough has been the introduction of orange shades. All annual forms need protection from frost.
