New Council's first priority to fix immediate road damage

Our region's new Councillors are visiting and seeing first-hand the extent of damage to our road network from the continuous wet weather, visiting Michelago, Burra Rd and the flood damage to Tinderry Bridge site earlier this week.

Snowy Monaro Regional Council is committed to understanding the extent of road and bridge damage so that works are prioritised and effectively utilise available funding.

"Our Council has secured disaster relief funding from the NSW State Government to address the immediate impacts of the unprecedented wet weather the Snowy Monaro has experienced in recent months," said Mayor Narelle Davis, Snowy Monaro Regional Council.

She explained that Council employees have been working relentlessly to deal with the most urgent problems on our region's roads following this summer's extreme rain events. Properties were left cut -off from the road network, important regional thoroughfares were left impassable, and bridges and causeways were destroyed by surging creeks and rivers.

"The focus for the short-term work now is on access for residents and services, plus safety," said Mayor Davis.

As these immediate and critical issues are addressed, more and more roads across the region will be brought back to an acceptable short-term standard. While this remediation is underway, Council will be working to prioritise the long-term plan for our region's road network and to secure appropriate funding to get the work done as soon as possible.

Across our region's 15,162 square kilometres, Council is responsible for the maintenance of a road network of 2,467.68km, of which 1,702.15km are unsealed. Council is further responsible for the maintenance of 95 different bridges, 65 of which are on unsealed roads. 34 of these are timber bridges.

On Monday 24 January 2022, some of the Councillors visited Bombala to further understand the extent of damage to the roads in the south of the region. They also inspected roads in the Delegate area.

PATHWAY TO A DEGREE IN HEALTH.

With the local area, along with the rest of Australia currently experiencing a shortage of nurses and Doctors, a recent article in the Monaro Post by Chloe Campbell is very topical. In the article Chloe tells of the path which led her to study medicine at the Charles Sturt University in Orange. Because she suffers from dyslexia, her ATAR score was not very high, so she enrolled as an Assistant in Nursing, which she said is very well supported by TAFE and after her first year of training, she was able to work in hospitals while studying for her Bachelor Degree. Now having completed her first year of studying medicine, Sophie is thoroughly enjoying her time at the Orange University Campus where she lives. During the holidays she returns home to Bombala to work on the farm and as a nurse at Bombala Hospital.

The pathway to nursing was easier in the past for country girls, when they could live and train at any large training hospital, but with University Degrees required, it became too expensive for many, having to move away from home to large centres.

At the Public Meeting regarding the Delegate MPS, the Monaro Manager of Great Southern Health Brian Bonham, said that if there was interest in the area, for Assistants in Nursing, he would guarantee local training. We know of two local women who wish to take part and they have already enrolled at Bega TAFE.

RURAL TRANSACTION CENTRE CELEBRATES IT'S 20TH BIRTHDAY

The Rural Transaction Centre opened in Delegate 20 years ago in 2002, made possible by a Commonwealth Grant, which enabled the Delegate Progress Association to purchase the previous bank building and set up the centre with office services such as printing and a Centrelink service. At that time there was also a Medicare Service where Medicare could be contacted and refunds claimed.

Ian Sellers was the Manager at the time and was on site five days per week. Later when the funding ran out, unlike many other such Centres the service in Delegate has continued and improved with the help of volunteers. The building now houses the Bundian Way Aboriginal Gallery, a local Art and Craft section and computers for public use. During his time Ian commenced the "Delegate Doings" monthly paper, which is still published today, once again by volunteers. Opening hours are between 10am and 3pm and new volunteers are always welcome. Plans have not been made as yet to mark the date, but an Open Day is one idea up for consideration.



LOOKING BACK



Delegate Aboriginal Reserve.

The aboriginal Reserve at Delegate was established in 1892 and closed in 1957 on land which was known as the Delegate Common. Aboriginal families were moved on to the Reserve from throughout the district and the photo provided to us by Rosemary Poole (nee McKay) was of King Billy, his wife Dulcie and their family. Descendants of the families, including the McLeods and Mundy's came to the site in December 2015, to attend a ceremony to officially mark the spot as an Aboriginal place, which also includes a burial site. Unfortunately we do not have the surname of this family and would be pleased to receive any information about them.

Some Butterflies of Delegate Gardens

Butterflies are always a magical sight in the garden and it is very easy to attract them simply by growing

flowers that provide nectar. The butterfly mouthpart is a coiled straw that extends allowing them to access almost any flower that produces nectar but they do prefer those that also provides a landing site. The butterflies that we see are adults and whilst they can thrive on any type of nectar, they need very specific plants on which to lay their eggs for juvenile food. This is the critical aspect of survival of the species is the food supply for

their caterpillars. Butterfly caterpillars are just as colourful and stunning as the adults and they rarely occur in numbers that are a problem for gardeners with the exception of the introduced white butterfly whose pale green caterpillars make it impossible to grow so many of our staple vegetables.


Jezebel butterflies occur in Delegate. This photo of the Jezebel butterfly (Delias nigrina) feeding on white Buddleia (N.Z. butterfly bush) shows clearly the club shaped antennae which is the feature that differentiates butterflies from moths. The Jezebel caterpillars require mistletoe as the food

source. Mistletoe has been introduced to street trees in Melbourne to provide habitat for this butterfly and a range of other species. Healthy trees can support a number of mistletoes and the ability of mistletoe to recycle nutrients at a faster rate than their hosts can enriches the soil giving mistletoe a keystone role in ecosystem health.

Another native species common in Delegate is the orchard butterfly. It is unusual to be able to easily tell the male and female apart. The male is the black one. Its range has expanded with citrus cropping. The small larvae mimic bird droppings but as they grow they adopt camouflage green.

You might also see the vine moth, (Phalaenoides glycinae). It is a small day flying moth which makes you think that it could be a butterfly but check out the plain antennae. Its larvae have adapted to feed on introduced grape vines and fuchsias. The Indian Miner, which is now a major pest, was brought to Australia to combat moth damage in vineyards. I have seen a huntsman spider at night eat a caterpillar on a grape vine.

This year has seen a big emergence of the Common Brown (Heteronympha merope) The larvae feed



grasses are not allowed to mature the pupae are eliminated. Last year the Australian Painted Lady (Vanessa kershawi) was the most commonly seen butterfly Its larval foodplants are the daisies including capeweed. The Meadow Argus (Junonia villida) was also a feature of 2021 but

has not been seen much this year. Its larval foodplants include many garden plants such as snapdragon, verbena, portulaca, the weeds plantain and purpletop as well as the natives Scaevola (Fan flower) and Goodenia.

There are only three emperors in Australia and the one in our area is Polyura sempronius and it differs in that it drinks sap and rotting fruit and meat not nectar. It is a large butterfly that is easy to handraise. The larvae are found on wattles and Albizia



(the silk tree) that is reasonably common in

gardens here.
